

COLORED PEOPLE EXCITED IN BALTIMORE.

VIEWS OF OUR CORRESPONDENT. TO BE LYNCHED WITHOUT JUDGE OR JURY. CHURCH NEWS, LITERARY ITEMS, &c.

(From our Special Correspondent.) Baltimore Md., June 9th, 1886.

There is considerable speculation here in regard to the cause of the alarming frequency of lynching parties in the state of Maryland. Scarcely a month passes that a report of a "Negro lynched" is not heralded abroad. The Gaithersburg affair about which several innocent colored men came near losing their lives is fresh in the minds of all. The dispatches this morning bring reports from Calvert Co., of the lynching of a colored man charged with assaulting a little girl. There would perhaps not be so much cause for righteous indignation if these self constituted administrators of the law would be certain that they were hurling a guilty party into eternity, but in a majority of cases no sufficient care is taken to secure the right party, and an appetite for blood seems to be gratified if some "Negro brute" is made to dangle at the end of a rope. In these cases the one alleging the assault has only to identify somebody, and that somebody dies without ever an opportunity to establish his innocence. This inhumanity is all the more startling when seen in the light of the Gaithersburg case in which the young lady making the charge said that it was hard for her to make a proper identification as "all Negroes looked alike."

The National Government, which Bishop Turner describes as held together by "a rope of sand," has acknowledged its impotence, to protect those from whom it exacts allegiance; the state governments make no attempt in this direction and the unprotected man of color may well cry out in the language of the crucified. "Why hast thou forsaken me?"

The commencement exercises of the Centenary Biblical Institute will be held on Thursday evening in Asbury church. This is the only colored institution of the kind in this city and our citizens take a lively interest in its progress and welfare. On the same evening the young ladies Christian Lyceum will give an entertainment and sacred concert at Metropolitan hall.

The "Lincoln Glee club" composed of students from Lincoln University gave a vocal concert at the Dolphin St. Presbyterian church last evening to a large and appreciative audience. All the numbers were well rendered and the members of the club show special drill and careful preparation to entertain the public.

The "Blue Tea party" at St. Mary's chapel on Thursday evening was quite a social event in church circles. A large and select audience were in attendance. Mr. Perry the genial priest in charge of the chapel introduced Mr. J. S. Davis who made a few well chosen remarks to the ladies present.

Mrs. Hutchings Bishop, wife of the rector of St. Philip's church in New York, is visiting her husband's relatives in this city. Mr. Bishop is an old Baltimore boy, and has attached his present responsible position by a determination which would stop no where short of abundant success.

The Sharp street M. E. church will run an excursion to Harper's Ferry on the 17th inst., and large crowds are expected both from Washington and Baltimore. The pastor Rev. E. U. S. Peck is one of the most progressive and popular ministers in this city.
