WORLD'S FAIR NOTES.

Mrs. French-Sheldon, the intrepid African traveler, has applied for space for exhibiting at the World's Fair the fine collection of curious and trophies she has gathered.

Through the Department of State at Washington an official communication has been conveyed to the Board of Lady Managers of the World's Fair from the Queen of the Sandwich Islands.

The Baltimore and Ohio railroad will make an exhibit at the World's Fair showing the history and de-

velopment of railways from their beginning to the present time.

One of the most interesting exhibits in the Government building at the World's Fair will be a display of arms, uniforms, tents and flags in use in the United States army at various times since 1776. This display is being prepared in one of the Gray's Ferry arsenal buildings.

South Dakota will be creditably represented at the Exposition, having now \$22,000 in sight with which to prepare its exhibit. The money has been raised by subscription.

The progress of shipbuilding from earliest times up to the present will be shown by a very extensive exhibit which will be made by Laird Bros., the big English ship-building firm at Birkenhead.

A number of the far famed Kerry cows are to be taken from Ireland to Chicago, at the time of the World's Fair, for the purpose of presenting to the admiring gaze of visitors the spectacle of real Irish milkmaids and butter makers—pretty ones, of course—pursuing their avocation.

The United States Patent Office will exhibit at the World's Fair as complete a collection as possible of the models of all the important American patented inventions, with a view of showing the great advance in the several arts, which is due in no small degree to the encouragement and protection afforded by the patent system.

The exhibit which Washington state will make at the World's Fair, before being sent to Chicago, will be displayed at the Western Washington Industrial Exposition to be held Tacoma.

The educational exhibit from Wisconsin at the World's Fair, it is estimated, will require 6,000 square feet of space, and application for that amount has been made.

The ethnological exhibit at the World's Fair will include many curious from the Charlotte islands.

Mr. Richings, who is a native of Massachusetts, has for more than ten years traveled extensively in the South, suffered many iniquities because of his devotion to our interests, and observed many of the marvelous workings which he brings to the attention of the public through the three hundred and more views that he throws on the canvass. These include colleges, seminaries, and universities; private residences of thrifty citizens, places of business and churches. The faces of women, as well as men, who are pushing the race forward are included among the number. Mr. Richings' collection is comprehensive and quite complete. He seems not to have omitted any section nor to have neglected any commendable agency of our progress. His views, to be appreciated, need only to be seen. No young person can see this better side of the Afro-American without increased respect for their race, without being stimulated to greater self-denial and effort, without being every energy, straining every nerve, concentrating and consecrating all their powers of whatever nature for the progress of their race and country.

Mr. Richings will return early in the fall and make a complete canvass of the churches of our city when the record of 53 consecutive nights in Philadelphia will be surpassed.

Summary of Current Events.—The World's Doings for the Past Six Days Gathered and Condensed for Our Readers.

General.

Late heavy rains have produced floods in various parts of Illinois.

The granite workers in New York are gradually winning their strike.
