

FOR SEDUCTION.

J. H. Snowden Tried for This Crime.

His Victim Tells Her Story to The Jury.

She is Annie Johnson, a Friendless Stranger Swedish Girl.

While a Domestic in the Family of Rev. Dr. Eli Fay She Submits to Snowden Under Promise of Marriage.

J. H. Snowden, charged with seduction under promise of marriage, was on trial yesterday in Department 1 before a jury composed as follows: G. Griswold, T. N. McCracken, Millard Fillmore, Abel Sutton, C. C. Cass, J. W. Goodwin, A. Merriam, Frank Adams, J. B. Beebe, N. B. Nesbitt, D. D. Anderson, Robert Curlee.

Annie Johnson, a Swedish girl, who was in the laundry at Bellevue Terrace when Snowden was a cook in the establishment, and who afterwards went to live at Rev. Dr. Eli Fay's as a domestic, is the girl. She was put on the stand yesterday forenoon as soon as a jury had been impaneled, and told her story pretty much as it was told in the lower courts some months ago.

She first met Snowden at the Bellevue Terrace. He was a cook there and she was employed in the laundry of the house. When they first met she was displeased with him and did not care to meet him, but he was very affable and so persistent with his attentions that she could not get rid of him.

After a short vacation she went to Dr. Fay's house and entered upon her duties as a domestic. Snowden continued his attentions and renewed his proposals of marriage. She consented. He said he had a \$10,000 ranch in New Mexico; had \$600 in bank, and his father in Kansas City was willing to give him \$22,000. His finances were such that he could place her beyond the necessity of work.

After her consent to marry him he urged that they assume the relations of man and wife. Snowden continued his attentions and renewed his proposals of marriage. She consented. He said he had a \$10,000 ranch in New Mexico; had \$600 in bank, and his father in Kansas City was willing to give him \$22,000.

On cross-examination the girl said she was 23 years old. She was raised in Sweden, and came to America about twenty-one months ago. She came with two brothers. Snowden had illicit intercourse with her first about three weeks after she went to live at Dr. Fay's.

It was decided that flowers should be brought every Monday for the decoration of the permanent exhibit. The following committee was appointed to attend to this work next Monday: Mrs. J. A. Anderson, Mrs. Emma Allen, Mrs. C. M. Brown, Mrs. E. J. Bradford, Miss Mary Crawford and Mrs. A. W. P. Chubb.

Doctor William Brill testified that Snowden came to his office on the morning of December 11, 1889, about 6 or 7 o'clock, and asked him to go with him to see a servant-girl at Dr. Fay's who was ill. Snowden told the doctor to go with him directly to the girl's room, as the family was still asleep.

Mrs. Harriet Kelsey Fay, the wife of Rev. Dr. Fay, told how she came home after marriage to Dr. Fay, August 7, 1889. She found Annie Johnson there as domestic. When she arrived Snowden was there. From that on he came constantly to the house to see Annie. They sat together on the veranda or in the kitchen. He used to stay until well into the evening.
