A Number to be Recommended to the Council.

The sewer committee of the Council will recommend tomorrow the passage of ordinances declaring the necessity for a number of sewers in the southern part of the city which will connect with the Arroyo Seco main sewer. These sewers are as follows: On Figueroa street, from Jefferson to Washington; Thirty-first street from Figueroa 740 feet east; Thirtieth street from Figueroa to Hope; Hope street from Thirtieth to Twenty-eighth; Flower street from Thirtieth to Twenty-eighth; Twenty-eighth street from Figueroa 530 feet east; Twenty-seventh street from 530 feet east of Figueroa to 700 feet west; Adams street from 750 feet west of Figueroa to Grand avenue; Flower street from Adams to Twenty-third; Twenty-third street from Figueroa to 81. Longstreet tract; Twenty-second street from Figueroa street to lot 10. Plater subdivision; Twenty-first street from Figueroa to lot 19, Plater subdivision; Twentieth street from Figueroa to lot 20, Myrtle subdivision; Flower street from Twentieth to Washington; Twenty-first street and Lovelace avenue from Figueroa to Washington; Twenty-third street and Estrella avenue from Figueroa to Washington; Washington from Arroyo de los Reyes main at Hope street to Figueroa; Figueroa street from Washington to Pico; Pico street from Flower to Seventh; Eighth street from Pearl to Moore, and all the other streets in the Meyers tract westerly.
