Shoes and Slippers.

A shoe that is longer than the foot gives a look of slenderness, and it should be remembered that the apparent width of a foot is always seen at once, but the entire length is not so often visible. A slipper or a tie, judiciously curved on the instep, and ornamented with a very full rosette or a particularly large buckle, makes almost any foot presentable, and black slippers and black stockings are wonderful lesseners of size.—[Harper's Bazar.


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
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
