THE FIRE BOARD.

A Number of New Fire Alarm Boxes Recommended. The regular weekly session of the Board of Fire Commissioners was held yesterday morning in the city hall, W. S. Moore in the chair and Messrs. Keeffe, Kührts, Lovell and Mayor Hazard present.

The resignation of Frank Carr from the position of callman of engine company No. 1 was accepted, and in accordance with the recommendation of the chief, Chas. Freeman was appointed in his stead. The demand of the Crystal Spring Land and Water Company of \$128.50 was referred to the Council, as that body had contracted the debt and not the board.

The matter of filling the vacancy in the department caused by the suspension of Driver W. L. Register of engine No. 7 last week was then brought up, Mr. Keeffe nominating J. E. Springer. Mr. Lovell put in nomination C. P. Harrison, but on the vote being taken Springer was appointed by 4 votes to 1. On motion of Mr. Keeffe, Chas. Platt was appointed as callman in the department, to be placed by the Chief. The board then adjourned.
