A warrant was ordered drawn in favor of C. C. Mason for \$50, for salary returned to the Treasurer.

CRIMINAL NOTES.

Deputy Sheriff Brown, of San Bernardino, passed through the city yesterday with Albert Williams, who is en route to San Quentin for grand larceny. While waiting for the late train for the north Williams was placed in the city jail for safe-keeping.

Information was filed yesterday charging A. Anderson with committing an assault with a deadly weapon. It is charged that on February 26th he drew a pistol on P. M. Seaback. It is an outgrowth of the Nettie Sundberg kidnapping case. Anderson is Deputy Sheriff, and officers sometimes have not only to show a weapon but to use one.

SUDDEN DEATH.

S. L. Cutler Drops Down on the Street. Coroner Meredith held an inquest last night upon the body of Sumner L. Cutler, a native of Hopkinton, Mass., 60 years of age, who dropped dead at the corner of Second and Spring streets about 7:30 o'clock yesterday morning. The old man, who was employed as a clerk at the cigar store on the corner of First and Main streets, was walking along the street when he was seen to place his hand on his heart and pitch violently forward head downwards, and with a cry. He was picked up by bystanders and conveyed to the police station in the patrol wagon for medical treatment, but died before it could be obtained. On hearing the testimony of
