

LOCAL MELANGE.

Meeting of the Cable Railway Directors.

The Road Turned Over to Mr. J. F. Crank.

Several Items of Gossip in Railroad Circles.

Additions to the Chamber of Commerce Display—The Accident to Mrs. Snedaker Not Serious.

The last meeting of the Board of Directors of the Los Angeles Cable Railway Company was held yesterday morning. The meeting was a mere formality. The board turned over the road and all its belongings to J. F. Crank, who represents the Pacific Railway Company, the organization to which the stock of the original company was transferred.

Of this new company Mr. Crank is president and sole local director. It is not known whether Mr. Robinson will remain with the company, but it is generally believed that no very extensive change will be made in the personnel of the offices. Both Mr. Crank and Mr. Robinson are reticent about the matter, from which it may be inferred that it is still in doubt.

RAILWAY MATTERS.

Locomotive Excursionists—The Departure of Manager Wade.

The pioneer excursionists passed through Los Angeles yesterday morning at 2 o'clock on their way from San Diego north.

A special car of the New York and Erie line arrived in this city yesterday on the Southern Pacific. It is occupied by ten locomotive engineers, some of them accompanied by their wives and families. They are the engineers who have been in the service of the Erie road for thirty years. As a reward for their long period of meritorious services the company gives them a vacation of several weeks and provides them with transportation through the South and West. Yesterday they probably returned to Santa Monica. They will remain in the city several days. General Manager Wade, of the Southern California road left for the East yesterday. He will go as far as Topeka. The meeting of the directors of the Santa Fe system takes place in Topeka on the 8th of May, but it is stated that Mr. Wade will not be absent more than ten days, in which case he will return before the meeting takes place. The Manvel and Magoun party, which is now traveling over the Sonora division of the line in Mexico, will probably return to Topeka in a few days and will hold a few more conferences with Mr. Wade about the road in Southern California.

During the continuance of the flower festival the Southern California runs a special in from Duarte. It leaves that place at 6:35 in the evening, arriving here at 7:40. It leaves Los Angeles at 11 o'clock.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

The Additions to the Exhibit—Matters of Public Interest.

A large banner has been swung across Main street in front of the Chamber of Commerce, announcing to the passer-by that a free exhibit of California products may be seen up stairs. The banner was presented by D. A. Moriarty.

The fountain, which is to occupy a place at the east end of the exhibit hall, is now being erected. Work began yesterday.

A large number of the ladies of the annex are interested in the flower festival, which has the effect of diminishing the donations of flowers for the exhibit. It must be remembered that most of the people who the flower festival attracts into the city from the outside will visit the exhibit, and it ought, therefore, to look its best.

The additions to the display yesterday were as follows: C. Cole, Colegrove, sheet of barley; Th. Roussein, a display of oysters; James Root, River figs, almonds and walnuts; Jas. Duncan, Gardena, a sheet of alfalfa; I. Evans, horse-radish. Vases were contributed by Mrs. Quackenbush and Mr. Moody; flowers by Mrs. Sam'l D. Caswell, Mrs. H. Quackenbush and Mrs. S. L. Sherry. The Board of Directors of the chamber will meet today.

IS IT REVENGE?

C. W. Corlew Charged With Complicity in a Robbery.

Yesterday morning T. R. Long appeared before Justice Austin for examination upon the charge of "holding up" and attempting to rob a milkman on Central avenue a few nights ago. On motion of his attorney, however, the case was continued until this morning at 9 o'clock.

Long swore to a complaint yesterday charging Chas. W. Corlew with complicity in the same crime, and the latter was arrested at 11 o'clock by Detectives Auble and Bowler and taken before Justice Austin for arraignment, when he was committed to jail in default of \$1,500 bonds, until this morning. It is stated that Long having learned that Corlew had given the officers some information regarding himself, immediately charged his "pal" with being an accessory; but it remains to be seen whether or not he was merely endeavoring to get even with him by causing his arrest and incarceration.

A RIDING ACCIDENT.

It Was Not so Serious as Reported at First.

It appears that Mrs. W. H. Snedaker, who fell from her horse at Grand avenue and Twenty-third street Tuesday evening was not as seriously injured as at first reported. No bones were broken, and the injuries were only bruises. The horse reared and fell back, but before he came over Mrs. Snedaker slipped out of the saddle, otherwise she might have been killed.

FIRST STREET.

The Grade Discussed Before Mayor Hazard.

The same arguments that have been made before the Board of Public Works, the Council and in property-owners' meetings, in relation to the First-street grade, were heard yesterday morning by Mayor Hazard. A week ago the Council passed an ordinance of intention to establish the grade of First street, from Broadway to the west city limits, so that in no place will it have a rise of more than one foot in twenty-five feet. This provides for a tunnel about 450 feet long under Grand avenue and Bunker Hill avenue, and is opposed by a number of the property-owners on the hill who desired a grade of one foot rise in ten feet from Grand avenue easterly. On the other hand the people residing beyond the hill are desirous of having the grade established according to the ordinance passed. This ordinance is now in the hands of Mayor Hazard for signature, and it was to obtain the views of the property-owners that he called the meeting yesterday morning. The representatives of the people residing west of the hills argued that they were cut off from the business center of the city, and that, as First street would be a street reaching from one boundary line to the other, if graded as desired, it was the street of all others that should have a traffic grade. The people on the hills, through their representatives, urged that the grade as proposed would leave them without a good grade and would injure them greatly. A number of speakers on both sides were heard, and the Mayor took the matter under consideration. He has two or three days yet to hold the ordinance before he must return it, with or without his signature, and it is not anticipated that he will make his decision public before tomorrow.

POLICE PICKINGS.

A NUMBER OF ITEMS GATHERED IN CRIMINAL CIRCLES.

Manuel Carrillo Charged With Assaulting a Woman—They Played Without the Proper Permit.

Manuel Carrillo was arrested on Upper Main street at 4:45 o'clock yesterday afternoon, by Officer Farmer, on a warrant charging him with having assaulted a woman named Antonia Mendez. Carrillo was taken before Justice Austin, who released him from custody on depositing \$20 cash bail for his appearance for arraignment this morning. Carrillo alleged that his arrest was merely a piece of spite work on the part of the woman, as he had filed a complaint against her in the Township Court, charging her with assault to murder. He stated that they had a quarrel on Tuesday night at their house, on the corner of Bellevue and Castelar streets, and that the woman, in a fit of jealousy, shot at him with a pistol. He rushed at her, however, and grappled with her, until he disarmed her and ejected her from the house, and she alleges that in her rage at being nonplussed she swore to the complaint against him.

WITHOUT A PERMIT.

A Band of Musicians Arrested on Spring Street.

Yesterday morning at 10 o'clock Detectives Auble and Bowler arrested six musicians, who were playing in front of a shoe store on Spring street, for violating the new ordinance, and took them to the station. They were registered as J. C. Scott, Leon Scott, Ray Scott, Bert Scott, J. W. Harris and Miss Maud Scott, and upon depositing the sum of \$5 each all were released from custody. They subsequently appeared before Justice Austin for arraignment, and upon motion of the District Attorney, Miss Maud Scott and two of her brothers, Leon and Ray, were discharged. The others, however, were ordered to appear for trial on Monday afternoon next, bail being required in the meantime in the sum of \$1 each.

TEMPEST IN A TEA POT.

The Missile Used by an Angry Chinaman.

Ah Sam, the proprietor of a laundry on Spring street, near Sixth, was arrested at 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning by Officer Connolly, on the charge of assaulting one of his employees by throwing a bowl full of tea at him during a dispute. He was subsequently taken before Justice Lockwood, who placed him under bonds in the sum of \$100 to appear for examination on Monday next.

ARRESTED AT MOJAVE.

Chas. Nelson Charged With Stealing a Watch.

Officer Sanchez went up to Mojave yesterday afternoon to bring back a negro named Chas. Nelson, who was arrested at that place by Constable McKenzie on a telegram from Chief Glass. Nelson is charged with having stolen a \$30 watch from the pocket of a carpenter named A. Roth on Monday last.

McCusker Bailed Out.

J. A. McCusker is out on bail. A brother who lives in the central part of the State has arrived here to see what is the matter with McCusker. He at once set about getting bail for the incarcerated man. There is an uncle of the alleged culprit living here in the city, and he has a very charming wife. McCusker going to his uncle through this aunt got him to go on the bond with his brother. These two gave a bond of \$1,500 and McCusker went free. He is charged with the crime of forgery, in forging an order for money on the City Auditor.

Peter McNeil.

Peter McNeil has been tried twice on a charge of burglary, the offence consisting in taking a fancy mirror from a lodger's room at a hotel. The first jury disagreed, and the second one acquitted him of the charge.

The County Central Committee to Meet. Mr. Eugene Germain, chairman of the Democratic County Central Committee, has called a meeting of that body, to be held at the Iroquois Club rooms in this city on Thursday, May 1st, or one week from today. The campaign is pretty nearly on in dead earnest, and the clans are to be gathered for the fray. Notice will be sent by mail to all the members of the committee.

CITY MATTERS.

The Police Commission Holds a Light Session.

A Number of Licenses and Transfers Granted.

The Fire Commissioners Recommend More Hydrants.

The Sells Case Still in Court—Testimony for the Prosecution Concluded. Other Local Items.

The Police Commissioners met yesterday afternoon in the Mayor's office, Mr. Dexter in the chair, and Messrs. Collins, Knox and Lewis present.

The applications of Chas. Schmidt for a transfer of the license for No. 105 San Pedro street from Theodore Froehlinger, and Sobrio & Joeriman for a transfer from J. A. Sobrio for the City gardens, were granted.

The application of Hans Forster for a permit to obtain a license for a new saloon at No. 226 S. Spring street was referred to the Chief under the rule.

Demands amounting in the aggregate to \$29 were approved. The application of Officer L. D. Rich for three days' leave of absence was granted to the extent of two days, on the recommendation of the Chief.

Chief Glass brought up the matter of feeding the prisoners, and stated that he had sent a communication to the Council, but that body wanted the matter to come from the board. On motion of Mr. Lewis, a committee was appointed to make requisition for the necessary supplies with which to board the prisoners from the city jail, and the chair appointed Messrs. Collins and Lewis as such committee.

At the suggestion of the Chief, it was agreed to hold a special session at 10 o'clock on Friday morning to approve the pay-roll of the department.

Mr. Collins moved that the rule be suspended in the case of J. Fleishman, the proprietor of a saloon at No. 53 Wilmington street, and that he be granted a new permit to obtain a license, and Mr. Knox having seconded the motion, it was carried unanimously. The board then adjourned.

THE FIRE BOARD.

A Number of New Hydrants are Recommended.

At the meeting of the Board of Fire Commissioners held yesterday morning in the Mayor's office, there were present Mr. Kuhrtz in the chair, and Messrs. Moore and Keeffe.

The pay-roll of the department for the month of April, amounting to \$3,205, was approved.

On motion of Mr. Keeffe, Driver M. Moriarty, of hosecart No. 2, was suspended until May 1st for having absented himself from duty without leave. Chief Strohm reported that at the request of Major Bonsall, of the committee on fire and water, he had located the following places for fire hydrants, as the most convenient and necessary locations in his district: Clara Belle and Union avenue, First and Union avenue, Ocean View and Union avenue, Bonnie Brae and Fourth streets, Belmont and Silver streets, Loma drive and Silver street, Lucas avenue and Third street, Bixel and Beaudry avenue, Bellevue and Beaudry avenues.

The Chief also recommended that a new hydrant be placed at the corner of Fifteenth and San Pedro streets; that the hydrant on the corner of First and Los Angeles streets be moved to the line of the street, and that the hydrant in front of J. Workman's driveway at Boyle Heights be moved. On motion of Mr. Keeffe the Council was requested to carry out the above.

The application of J. W. Hyland for a position as callman was referred to the Chief.

A communication was received from G. J. Denis, attorney for the owners of the fire alarm system, and was referred to the Chief Engineer. Proposals for the furnishing of fire alarm boxes were received as follows, and were referred to a committee consisting of Messrs. Kuhrtz, Keeffe, Moore and Chief Strohm: W. F. Griggs, agent, to furnish seven boxes at \$120 each, similar to those now in use, delivered on board the cars at Omaha, Nebraska, and California Electric Works, 7 boxes, delivered at the city hall, Los Angeles, at \$100 each.

THE SELLS CASE.

The Testimony for the Prosecution Closed.

The preliminary examination of George W. Sells, charged with feloniously carrying away the ballot box used at an election in the Vineland irrigation district, on the 2d inst., was resumed yesterday morning, and occupied most of Justice Austin's time during the day. I. N. Rhodes and J. H. Duncan were recalled for the prosecution, and the latter, together with six other witnesses, testified that he had voted for Finley on the day of the election. For the defense a witness named Niemann was called and testified that on the night of the election he had seen the ballot box placed in a room in his house by Sells, and that it remained untouched until the 7th inst., when he, at Sells's request, carried it down to the meeting of the Board of Directors, under his arm, and was present when the ballots were counted. At the close of his testimony the case was continued, on motion of the defendant, until 9:30 o'clock on Wednesday morning next.
