CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

Produce for Exhibit Sent to California on Wheels—Its Travels.

The secretary of the Chamber of Commerce has received a letter from S. T. Hubbard, Jr., the secretary of the New York Cotton Exchange, asking the chamber to pass resolutions opposing the Butterworth bill. This is a measure now pending before Congress, which makes operations in futures a misdemeanor. The letter sets forth the idea that the bill will be injurious to the farmers of the country.

A consignment of California produce for the California on Wheels was shipped from the chamber yesterday. It comprised a box of oranges, a box of lemons and a box of vegetables. When California on Wheels first started out it was estimated that about one million people would visit the display in the course of its itinerary. It has gone only as far as Iowa, and up to the middle of this month, about one-third of the route being covered, 537,000 have visited the cars. It is expected that when the expedition reaches New England it will attract a larger attendance than in the Middle West, as the large number of excursion parties which have recently gone out from that section to California will serve to make this State better known there. It is now estimated by the managers of the expedition that nearly two million people will visit the cars in the course of the trip.

THE CABLE ROADS.

A Peculiar Situation Which No One Appears to Comprehend.

The Los Angeles cable railway's affairs are unusually full of rumors in these days. A HERALD reporter was yesterday informed by a prominent stockholder of the company that Mr. Robinson, the present superintendent, tendered his resignation at the meeting of the Board of Directors, which took place last Wednesday. This resignation, it is stated, was accepted, to take effect at the end of sixty days. A leave-of-absence of sixty days was thereupon voted Mr. Robinson, so it is said, and his connection with the company ceased forthwith. Resolutions commending his work as superintendent were placed upon the minutes, and the board expressed regret that he should have left the service of the company.

This is the story told by several of the stockholders. Mr. Robinson is, however, still in charge of the company's affairs. He declines to make any statement in the matter, except to declare that the above is not true. The board will hold a confirmatory meeting next Wednesday, at which the matter is likely to be settled in some shape. It is generally understood that the disagreement in the company extends back to the local management to the stockholders and officers in Chicago, that Mr. Holmes is likely to resign from the presidency, and that extensive changes will be made. It is said that a gentleman from the name of Mann will come out from Chicago, to take the local management of the road. The friends of Mr. Robinson deny this, and say that when the final settlement is reached he will remain in his present position.
