TAKING THE CENSUS.

How the Work Will Be Accomplished in This District.

For some time past people who wanted to work for the Government at the job of enumerating the population and collecting statistics for the eleventh census have been handing in their names to L. E. Mosher, the superintendent of this district. The "slate" was completed and sent on to Washington several weeks ago. One hundred and seventy men will be appointed for this district, and the list will probably soon be made public. The census district does not correspond exactly with the Congressional district. It includes San Diego, San Bernardino, Orange, Los Angeles, Ventura, Santa Barbara and Inyo counties. There are five of these districts in this State, and this is the fifth.

Of the 170 men who are to be set to work in this district 80 will be employed in Los Angeles county. They will start out on the first Monday in June. Thirty days are allowed for the work in the country districts and two weeks in the cities. Mr. Mosher will open his office in the Bryson-Bonebrake block during the month of May to begin on the work of subdividing the district and preparing the lists. The blanks contain about thirty questions. They are designed to obtain not only statistics of population but also of manufactures, farm products, health, etc. It is estimated that the work will be finished at Washington, and the result of the count made public, by the 20th of August.

The men who work at collecting the facts for the census will receive from \$4.00 to \$6.00 a day.


