NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT an application will be made by the undersigned to the Board of Supervisors of Los Angeles County, at their room in the court house of said county, in the City of Los Angeles, on Monday, the 5th day of May 1890, at the opening of their session of that day, or as soon thereafter as the application can be heard, for authority to construct a wharf upon the shore of the Pacific ocean at Catalina Island, and to take tolls for the use of the same, for the term of twenty years.

The location and description of said wharf is as follows: Beginning at a point which bears easterly twenty feet from the intersection of the center line of Crescent avenue (which is eighty feet wide), with the center line of Catalina avenue (which is sixty feet wide), in the town of Avalon, according to the plat of survey of said town made in August, 1887, by Pillsbury & Cleveland, surveyors said map or plat being recorded in book 28 of miscellaneous maps, page 67, records of Los Angeles county, to which said map and the record thereof reference is here made for description, said point of beginning being upon the center line of Catalina avenue, extended easterly from the center line of Crescent avenue, to the center line of Crescent avenue, with the center line of Catalina avenue, and extending from said point of commencement easterly to the Pacific ocean, two hundred and twenty feet; said wharf being twenty feet in width, and the center line of Catalina avenue produced being the center line of said wharf.
