

THE CLARK CASE.

AN INTERESTING ACTION IN THE JUSTICE COURT.

Charge of Obtaining Goods by False Pretenses—Testimony for the Prosecution.

Justice Lockwood was occupied nearly the whole of yesterday in the examination of Mrs. Belle Clark, Miss P. M. Seaman and F. K. Clark, the Pasadena lawyer, upon the charge of having, on November 4, 1889, obtained property of the value of \$52 from the Parisian Cloak and Suit Company, by means of fraudulent and false representations. The defendants raised an objection to the proceedings when the case was called, as they had been arraigned upon the charge as a misdemeanor, and had entered their respective pleas thereto a prior date, and on this ground they claimed that they could not be charged with felony upon the same complaint. The court overruled the objection and the case was opened with the testimony of the complainant, J. S. Salkey, which was in effect as follows: On November 4, 1889, Mrs. Clark and Miss Seaman called at the Parisian Cloak and Suit Company's store at No. 119 South Spring street, and the latter talked to Mrs. S. M. Hayte, one of the saleswomen, and asked for credit. While the ladies were talking, J. D. Stewart, one of the salesmen, came up, and after joining in the conversation, called upon Salkey, the manager. Miss Seaman then repeated her request for credit, stating that she owned property on Colorado court, Pasadena, which was worth \$20,000, and upon which there were encumbrances amounting to \$1,500 or \$2,000. Salkey stated that the firm was not in the habit of giving credit, and intimated to Miss Seaman that property was not worth so much in Pasadena at that time as it had been formerly. The lady replied that she expected some remittances from New York in a short time, and after some further conversation on the subject, Salkey asked her if she had any references from any other merchants in that city. Miss Seaman promptly replied that she had never had occasion to ask anyone else for credit and consequently this was out of the question; but her attorney, Mr. F. K. Clark, might be referred to. Salkey obtained the lawyer's address, and, after the ladies left the store, promising to return later in the day, he dispatched a boy with a note to Clark, asking him to call at the store. Clark was not in his office at the time, but he subsequently called in person and interviewed Mr. Salkey, replying to that gentleman's queries that his client was exactly as she had stated, and that she was good for any amount. Accordingly, when the ladies returned in the afternoon they were waited upon by Miss Nellie Ryan, another saleswoman, and selected cloaks to the value of \$52. One of the garments, a child's cloak, they carried themselves, the others being sent by express. About a week later Miss Seaman and her sister returned to the store and attempted to exchange one of their cloaks, but their mission was unsuccessful, as Salkey refused to allow them to do so. At the expiration of thirty days time, Salkey wrote to Miss Seaman, enclosing the bill for the goods; but she replied to the effect that if he crowded her for the money, she would immediately homestead her property and then he would not get anything.

Mrs. S. M. Hayte and Miss Nellie Ryan, the two salesladies, who waited upon the ladies, corroborated the testimony of Manager Salkey, and detailed the conversations which occurred between them. E. E. Crandall, the next witness, was put on the stand to testify that the defendants obtained a stove from him in the same manner, but the defendants objected and the court took the matter of the relevancy of such testimony under advisement until 9:30 o'clock this morning when the case will be resumed.

FRUIT PICKING.

A Chance for the Employment of the Boys.

The small-fruit-raisers in the vicinity of Vernon, Florence and Compton are having considerable trouble with the Chinamen, and a good many of them are anxious to make some other arrangements for the picking of fruit. The strawberry crop is now ready for picking, and it is suggested that there is a chance for the boys who want to earn good wages to obtain employment in that part of the country. The work is

not exhausting, and it is something which children can do as well as not. It is suggested that if an effort is made by those interested in the boys out of employment, the fruit-raisers will give them the preference. If action is to be taken in the matter it should be at once, as the season is now nearly at its height.

SECTION 1.
