

BI-METALLISM.

The Cause Growing at Home and Abroad.

British Bi-Metallists Lament Senator Beck's Death.

Educating Influence of the Monetary Debate in Congress.

The Senate Republican Committee Adopts the Jones Silver Bill With a Few Amendments.

LONDON, May 6.—Mr. Gibbs, ex-governor of the Bank of England, and president of the Bi-Metallic League, cables Senator Jones, in the name of the Bi-Metallic League, deeply regretting the death of Senator Beck, "whose services in the cause of monetary reform are most warmly appreciated," and adding: "The bi-metallist party in the United Kingdom, now including over one hundred members of the house of commons, attach the greatest value to the debate about to commence in your illustrious chamber. We fully recognize, not only that the support afforded silver by your legislation during the past twelve years, has helped to protect the industrial world from an acute monetary crisis, but also, that the debates in Congress have served more than all else to educate people to a recognition of the important issues involved. We believe also, that the increased coinage of silver contemplated by congress, will restore, wholly or considerably, your coinage rates, and will thus make an international settlement of this complex question comparatively easy. We anticipate further, with much confidence, that the advance in the price of silver which must follow your action will stimulate the export trade of your country, and, while tending to the prosperity of your agricultural classes, will also assist the manufacturing industries of the United Kingdom and the whole body of our wage-earners."

THE JONES BILL.

The Senate Committee Adopts It With a Few Amendments.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—An effort was made by the senate republican silver committee to agree upon a silver bill to be reported to the caucus. Three of the thirteen members were absent. The ten present, together with Senator Stewart, who was invited to take part in the proceedings, after a discussion lasting nearly three hours, decided to report to the caucus to be held some day this week, the bill reported by Senator Jones from the finance committee some weeks ago, with amendments.

One of the amendments strikes out the provision in the reported bill, that the notes issued for the purchase of bullion when redeemed shall be canceled, and instructs the secretary of the treasury to restrict them with the proviso that the amount outstanding shall not at any time be in excess of the amount paid out for the bullion deposited.

Another amendment is the addition of the sixth section of the bill adopted by the house caucus, which provides for covering into the treasury about seven million dollars of lawful money now held for the redemption of national bank notes.

The Jones bill directs the secretary of the treasury to purchase monthly silver bullion to the value of \$4,500,000, the notes in payment thereof to be redeemable in lawful money.

Senator Mitchell stated that while personally he was in favor of the free coinage of silver, he believed the measure (the bullion redemption clause having been omitted) to be free from any vicious principle, and one that if adopted would ultimately lead to free coinage. In this Senator Teller agreed.

THE CLAYTON INQUIRY.

Suspect Bentley Testifies—Carroll Armstrong Apologizes.

LITTLE ROCK, May 6.—The Clayton committee heard a number of witnesses today, the most important one being Oliver T. Bentley, the man whom General Clayton suspects of having killed his brother. Bentley is a deputy sheriff of Conway county, and claims to have been in Morrilton on the night Clayton was killed at Plummerville. Today he brought in papers to corroborate this claim. Chairman Lacy dictated to Bentley a letter received by the town marshal of Morrilton, after the killing, signed "Jack the Ripper No. 1," and containing many dire threats. There was no similarity whatever between the handwriting of the letter and that of Bentley. Carroll Armstrong today apologized to the committee for the strong language used by him last night.

PENSION LEGISLATION.

The Senate Committee Non-Concurs in the Action of the House.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—A meeting of the senate committee on pensions was held today, at which the Morrill disability and service pension bill combined, substituted by the house for the senate dependent pension bill, was considered. Formal action was postponed until the next meeting of the committee. It is understood, however, that opposition to the house measure was unanimous, and the committee will recommend that the senate non-concur in the action of the house.

PRATT'S DEFENSE.

Alleged Attempt to Kidnap His Wife and Child.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—In the Pratt trial today, defendant on cross-examination denied that he had ever been told by physicians that his wife was subject to hallucinations, and was not responsible for her actions. He furthermore stated, in response to counsel's inquiries, that he had been told that there was an effort made to kidnap his wife and child and take them to Australia, or wherever they would not be able to appear at the trial.

Hawley's Haul.

BELOIT, Wis., May 6.—A letter received from Joseph M. Hawley, the absconding member of the failed firm of Mather & Co., confesses that he lost the funds of the bank in speculation. He says he is en route for Cuba. An investigation is in progress; the worst is feared.

Quinlan's Queer Transactions.

NEW YORK, May 6.—The friends of Washington Quinlan have been unable to find him. On the stock exchange

11,000 shares were today bought in for his account. It is believed all his outstanding contracts have been closed.

TO REPAIR THE DAMAGE.

Boutelle, of Maine, Wants to Mend the Impaired Prohibition Laws.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Boutelle, of Maine, today introduced in the house a bill intended to repair the damage inflicted to the state prohibition laws by the recent decision of the supreme court in the original package case. The bill is in the shape of an amendment to the interstate commerce act, as follows: "Nothing contained in this act shall be construed to authorize the sale or traffic in intoxicating liquors in any state, contrary to the laws thereof."

MOREHEAD REWARDED.

Five Thousand Dollars for Seizing Smuggled Opium.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Assistant Secretary Tichenor today made an award of \$5,000 to S. L. Morehead, a citizen of San Francisco, for services in connection with the seizure of a large quantity of opium smuggled into San Francisco a year ago. The award was the maximum allowed by the law. It is said Morehead was offered large pecuniary inducements not to betray the smugglers, and spurned them all.

Church Trustees Fined.

CHICAGO, May 6.—The trouble in the Humboldt Park Evangelical church, growing out of the split at the late conference, came up in the police court today. Trustees William Soliman and Edward Hintz were fined \$100 each for forcibly ejecting Pastor Vetter from the pulpit.

A Philanthropist's Will.

PHILADELPHIA, May 6.—The will of the late George F. Pfeiffer, president of the academy of fine arts, was probated today. It disposes of an estate of about \$2,000,000, of which \$1,067,000 is divided among public institutions.

BECK'S FUNERAL.

SERVICES HELD IN THE SENATE CHAMBER.

Both Houses Suspend Business to Attend the Obsequies—The Funeral Train En Route to Lexington, Kentucky.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—Under a dripping sky the remains of the late Senator Beck were borne this morning to the capitol. Arriving at the east front of the senate wing, the casket was borne up the steps into the marble room, where it was visited by several hundred persons before its removal to the senate chamber.

After the formal opening of the senate a short recess was taken. After the reading of the journal the senate adjourned, to enable the members to attend the funeral of Senator Beck.

About 10 o'clock the senate reconvened. The house of representatives, supreme court, diplomatic corps, president and cabinet appeared and took seats. Then the casket was borne in, followed by the mourners. Brief funeral services were conducted by Chaplain Butler and ex-Chaplain Bullock. The casket was borne out by a detail of capitol police, followed by the official bodies, and the senate adjourned till tomorrow.

The casket, followed by the funeral procession, composed of members of the senate and house, the president and cabinet and mourners, was taken to the Baltimore and Potomac depot and put on board the train for conveyance to Kentucky.

The special train carrying the remains and those accompanying them started at 3 p. m. It is scheduled to reach Lexington tomorrow morning. The funeral will be held Thursday.

ROMAYER'S DUPES.

Hundreds of Impeccuous Noblemen Who Had Titles to Swap for Fortunes.

NEW YORK, May 6.—The World's cable from Berlin says: "An interesting postal secret has just leaked out. Evidently the first disclosures were made in the case of Romayer, who conducted in California a bureau for the furnishing of rich American women as wives to impeccuous German nobility, there have been anxious hearts in Berlin. Some of the letters addressed to Romayer by needy fortune-hunters were published, and in consequence two officers of the imperial guard were forced to resign. The news of Romayer's suicide arrived here the anxiety of those who had written to him was somewhat relieved, but still remained. Some officers were in much trepidation. They did not know into whose hands their letters had fallen. Some days ago, however, a big batch of these letters was returned to Berlin by the United States postal authorities. The postal department opened them and returned them to the writers. The German postal department keeps a letter secret inviolable, but enough has leaked out to prove that quite a number of guardsmen and noblemen, some of them belonging to very aristocratic families, were implicated. The contents of these letters are amusing. One count, who makes a living as reporter for a newspaper, asked \$100,000 for the honor of conferring his name and hand upon some California heiress. A Polish prince asked a million for his title. Over 300 letters were returned to Berlin alone. How many were sent back to other parts of Germany, no one can tell."

The Court House Question to be Voted on in San Bernardino County.

COLTON, May 6.—The petition of the people to the board of supervisors of San Bernardino county, praying submission to the voice of the people on the removal of the court house, was acted on today, and an election will be ordered.

CHICO, May 6.—At the state camp of Sons of Veterans today the report of the colonel of the division was read and filed. The committee on constitution, rules and regulations reported, and sections were adopted. The convention then went into committee of the whole on the ritual.

AN INSANE MOTHER.

She Tries to Strangle Her Children.

One Little Girl Choked to Death.

The Other Escapes by Outrunning the Frenzied Parent.

The Unfortunate Woman Then Makes a Horrible Attempt at Suicide.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—A Chronicle special from Traver, California, says: At 8 o'clock last night Mrs. T. A. Bresler, who lives with her husband five miles from this place, sent her two girls, aged 11 and 9 years, to bed, and shortly thereafter entered the room, and seizing the oldest girl by the throat, proceeded to strangle her to death. The younger child ran from the room, pursued by the mother, who was still clinging to the other child. The mother followed 200 yards and dropped the older child, who was then dead, and after pursuing the other some distance gave up the chase and returned home. The little girl soon arrived at a neighbor's and gave the alarm. Meanwhile the husband returned home, and finding no one in the house, gave several calls and was finally answered by his wife. Going to the back of the house he found her in a pool of blood. He carried her into the house and found that the front part of her head was literally chopped to pieces. She was perfectly conscious, and said she inflicted the wounds on herself, but gave no reason for doing so. She told him where her child was, and the neighbors, who had then arrived, soon found the body, which was closely guarded by a faithful dog. Several physicians were summoned and pronounced the woman's case hopeless, the axe with which the deed was done having penetrated her brain in several places. The coroner has left here to hold an investigation. The woman was evidently insane.

Killed by His Son-in-Law.

FRESNO, May 6.—News was received this afternoon of the killing of J. M. Cornick, by his son-in-law, Henry Sullivan, at a mining claim on the San Joaquin river, at Temperance Flat. No particulars. Cornick and Sullivan had not been on good terms for years. The former has often been before the courts for various offenses.

The Man Wanted.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6.—An officer of the Chicago detective force arrived last night with a requisition for W. E. Johnson, colored, arrested here a few days ago, charged with the murder of Mr. Biggar, colored, in Chicago, last March. The officer says he has no doubt that Johnson is the man wanted.

Napa Elections.

NAPA, Cal., May 6.—At the municipal election yesterday, Thomas Bain and E. B. Hennessy were elected trustees; Chas. W. Mero, city marshal; T. F. Rancey, city clerk; W. L. Burbeck and C. H. Starkweather, library trustees. The main interest centered in the city treasurer and marshal.

The Curtis Bill Killed.

ALBANY, N. Y., May 6.—The senate judiciary committee, this afternoon, by a vote of seven to two, postponed indefinitely the Curtis bill to abolish capital punishment, thus killing the bill.

Two Years at Hard Labor.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 6.—Thomas E. McCann, the druggist who was arrested for sending obscene matter through the mails, was today sentenced to two years imprisonment at hard labor.

Judge Head Dead.

REDWOOD CITY, May 6.—Judge E. F. Head, of the superior court of San Mateo county, died this morning from acute pneumonia, developed from a cold contracted Friday.

Decided to Affiliate.

PLACERVILLE, May 6.—The board of supervisors of El Dorado county held a special meeting last evening and decided to affiliate with the state board of trade.


