

THE DOG SHOW.

The Judge Begins the Work of Awarding Premiums.

Forty-Two Classes of Dogs Are Examined.

A List of the Dogs That Are Honored.

The Remaining Classes Will Be Judged Today—A Good Attendance Yesterday.

Yesterday was the second day of the bench show of the Southern California Kennel Club. The attendance was good throughout the day and was especially large at the time that the judge's decisions were being rendered. One o'clock was the hour set for beginning the work but some delay was experienced and the first dogs were not led into the judging ring until nearly two. H. H. Briggs of the Breeder and Sportsman, acted as judge of all classes.

The show closes tomorrow evening. Everything has gone smoothly thus far, no accidents being reported.

CITY MATTERS.

The Police Commissioners Hold a Meeting.

Several More Saloon Licenses Granted.

The Fire Commissioners Hold an Unimportant Meeting.

Notices Now Being Advertised by the City Clerk—He Abandoned His Contract.

It was fully thirty minutes after the appointed hour before a quorum of the board of police commissioners got together in the mayor's office yesterday afternoon, and when the meeting was called to order there were only Messrs. Collins, Dexter and Knox present. Mayor Hazard had been called away on business, and Mr. Lewis was reported to be out of the city. Captain Knox was the last to put in an appearance, and on his arrival he was requested to officiate as chairman.

The chief having reported favorably on the application of Hugh Cooney for a permit to obtain a license for a saloon at No. 1302 Alameda street, the same was granted.

The application of Jacob Baer for a new license at No. 312 North Main street was referred to the chief under the rule, but that of Cohen Bros. for a saloon license at No. 140 North Main street was granted, the rules being suspended to allow of the same.

A couple of demands, amounting in the aggregate to \$71, were approved.

A communication was received from C. Conell, enclosing the sum of \$20, to be divided among Detectives Auble, Bosqui, Bowler and Wallin, as a reward for their services in recovering a watch, diamond pin and \$50 in cash, stolen from him by George Wood, on March 18th last. The clerk was instructed to place the money in the city treasury to the credit of the police reward and charity fund.

The application of August Werner for a position on the special police force was referred to the chief for investigation, but that of John Freilinger for a similar privilege was granted.

A communication was received from G. C. Edwards, No. 106 Broadway, referring again to the claim of Mrs. J. J. Mahoney for two months' rent against Officer R. Martin, and stating that the chief had not taken any steps to inquire into the merits of the case, although the matter had been referred to him. On motion of Mr. Collins it was again referred to the chief for investigation.

The claims of Sing Lee, \$10, for laundry work, and of J. Eaton, \$6.50, for meal tickets, against Officer J. M. Pond or Wiley, were also referred to the chief.

A communication was received from the city clerk transmitting proposals for supplies for the city prisoners from J. Benner & Co., M. T. Ryan, S. Maier, C. Gassen, J. Walker, L. Ebinger, Edwards & Gillette, Seymour & Johnson and Hall & Packard.

Mr. Collins suggested that the bids be referred to a committee for investigation, and the chairman appointed Messrs. Collins, Dexter and Lewis as such committee, with instructions to report at the next meeting. As, however, it was deemed advisable to put the matter in the hands of the council on Monday next, it was resolved to hold a special meeting of the board on Saturday morning, at 10 o'clock, for the purpose of receiving the report of the supply committee.

The board then adjourned.
