

THE COUNCIL.

A New Master of the Pound Appointed.

City Taxes to be Collected Semi-Annually.

The Sale of the City Improvement Bonds.

The City Engineer Instructed to Prepare the Ordinance Establishing the Grade of First Street.

The city council met yesterday, President Frankfield in the chair, and Messrs. Bonsall, Shafer, Brown, Hamilton, Van Dusen, Wirsching, Summerland and McLain present.

The report of the board of public works, as published in the HERALD, was read and adopted. This included the recommendation that the city engineer prepare an ordinance of intention to fix the grade of First street so that it shall be no greater than one in twenty.

The city clerk reported that he had collected the certified check of Frick Bros., and had placed it in a special fund called the "forfeited check fund." Action approved.

The city attorney referred to his report of two weeks ago on the certified check for his opinion of the matter. Received and filed.

The street superintendent reported that it would not be well to remove the gravel as requested by J. D. Eagan and others, as too much earth on top would have to be taken away first. Adopted.

A contract for furnishing supplies at the city jail, with Seymour, Johnson & Co. was read and approved.

The city engineer reported that the majority of the frontage of Bartlett street was not represented in the protest of the property-owners.

An ordinance of intention to change the grade of Teed street was read and laid over for a week.

At this point a recess of ten minutes was declared, in order that Mr. Huntington, Colonel Crocker and the other members of the railroad party might be received.

An ordinance of intention to change the grade of a part of Grand avenue, near Third street, was read and referred to the board of public works.

Major Mitchell appeared and asked that the checks of Frick Bros. be returned, as the contract for constructing the sewer had not been drawn according to the advertisement.

He was instructed to draw a warrant on the city for the amount of the checks. The matter of the protest against the grading of Hancock street came up, and, on motion of Mr. Shafer, the protest was denied.

The committee on public buildings recommended that P. A. Mulford be granted five days' extension of time for completing a school house. Adopted.

The committee also recommended that the bid of W. R. Phelps for constructing the receiving hospital be accepted. Adopted.

The janitor committee recommended that Frick Bros. be granted an extension of time for constructing a janitor. Adopted.

The committee also recommended that janitors 8-R and No. 5 be piped by the property-owners. Adopted.

Also recommended that the mayor's objections to P. Keenan's demand for work done on the Zanjan Madre be sustained. Adopted.

Also recommended that a part of zanjan No. 3 be piped. Adopted.

The board of health asked for two extra sanitary inspectors. Granted by a vote of seven to one, Mr. Frankfield voting against.

The board of education requested that the council advertise for bids for constructing additions to the Breed-street, Amelia-street, Castelar-street, Temple-street, San Pedro-street and Seventh-street schools. Referred to the finance committee to see how much money is left in the funds.

The sewer committee recommended that the bid of John White for constructing a sewer on New High street be accepted. Adopted.

Mr. Van Dusen introduced a resolution requesting the citizens to observe memorial day, and the business men to close. Adopted.

Action was deferred thirty days on the matter of opening of several streets, pending a decision of the supreme court.

An ordinance fixing the license of hotel-runners at \$1 per month was read and adopted.

The finance committee recommended that the office of pound-master be declared vacant and that John E. Preston be appointed to the place.

Mr. Summerland presented a communication from several police officers giving Mr. Farrell a good reputation. He moved that the matter be referred to a special committee. Lost.

The report of the finance committee was adopted by a vote of 6 to 2. Messrs. Wirsching and Summerland voting against.

Mr. Hamilton moved that Mr. Preston be elected pound-master. Carried.

Mr. Wirsching moved that the pound-master be instructed not to place the dog pound north of Ninth street.

Mr. Hamilton moved to amend so as to allow the pound to be placed in the most convenient place. Carried.

The finance committee recommended that the bid of Kidder, Peabody & Co. for \$154,000 sewer bonds be accepted. Adopted.

Afternoon Session.

The matter of the collection of taxes came up and the finance committee recommended the passage of the ordinance making taxes collectible twice a year. Some of the recommendations of Mayor Hazard had been accepted, but the main suggestion, to the effect that taxes be made payable at any time after the first Monday in November, with one per cent. added for each month before the 1st of May and two per cent. after that date, was considered impracticable for the reason that taxes would not become delinquent for a year after they were due, and in the mean time the city funds might run short.

The ordinance as amended was read and adopted.

Mr. Van Dusen moved that a fire plug be placed on Downey avenue. Carried.

Mr. Summerland moved that the street superintendent be instructed to construct a sidewalk on North Main street between Marchessault and Walters streets. Carried.

The same gentleman moved that a sidewalk be constructed on Alameda street between Naud's warehouse and Railroad avenue. Carried.

Mr. Wirsching moved that the street

superintendent be instructed to put in a small piece of storm drain near Chicago street and Virginia avenue. Carried.

Mr. Shafer moved that a fire plug be placed on the corner of Twenty-eighth and Main streets. Carried.

An ordinance ordering a sewer on Second street, between Main and Los Angeles streets, was read and adopted.

Ordinances ordering a sidewalk on Twelfth street, Bartlett street graded and Patrick street graded were read and adopted.

A contract with J. Dolbeer, to furnish 15-inch pipe for sewers, was read and approved.

The finance committee presented the approved demand of Frick Bros., for \$5,343, the amount of the forfeited check. A motion to approve was lost by a vote of 5 to 3.

The city treasurer reported that he had deposited \$314,316 with the City Bank. Received and filed.

City Attorney McFarland called attention to the fact that some interest was due on the city money for the two months during which the other banks held the funds. Referred to the finance committee.

The opening of bids for the construction of the southern intercepting sewer was ordered and the first bid was read from Frick Bros.

President Frankfield asked whether or not Frick Bros. should not be barred from bidding, they having failed to make good a former contract.

The city attorney said the view he took of the case was that Frick Bros. had not refused to make good their bid. They had offered to enter into a contract which complied with the advertisement for proposals.

After examining the law the city attorney said the bid could be rejected if the council desired.

Mr. Shafer moved that the bid be received. Lost by a vote of 4 to 3.

The following proposals for constructing the southern intercepting sewer were read: J. J. Mahoney, 70 cents per foot; J. L. Mansfield, 79 1/2 cents; A. B. Warner, 68 cents; Laborers' Co-operative Union, 75 cents; M. McDonald, \$1.10.

The following bids for constructing the western intercepting sewer were opened: J. L. Mansfield, 80 cents; J. J. Mahoney, 80 cents; Thos. Copley, 99 cents; Laborers' Co-operative Union, \$1.10; M. McDonald, \$1.45.

The council then adjourned.
