Two Nice Sensations at La Crescenta.

Charley Fraley Elopes With Miss Della Carter.

A School Teacher Who Was Strongly Opposed to Dancing

He Refused to Let the Trustees Have the Keys of the School House—A Skeleton Key Used.

EDITORS HERALD—Quite a little breeze of excitement was occasioned in our place last week by the announcement that Mr. Fraley's eldest son, Charley, was married to Miss Della Carter, a former guest at Mr. Fraley's hotel. It was a genuine elopement. The parents of the young man objected to his attentions to the young lady in question, and about three weeks ago she left the hotel, taking up her abode with a neighboring family. There the young man continued his attentions until the serious remonstrance of his father caused both the young people to leave Crescenta. Their whereabouts were unknown to the parents until last week, when the mother received a letter from her son, dated New Mexico—their former home—telling her that he was married to the young lady, and requesting that his clothes be sent to him. The young man could not obtain a marriage license in Los Angeles, as he was a minor, being only 19 years of age, and as his father went immediately to the city upon learning of his son's departure and forbade the issuance of a license of marriage to him. Therefore the young couple went to a place where they could be married. The young lady is somewhat the elder of the two. She came here from Chicago on a visit last January. The father is naturally much incensed at the action of his son, while the mother is nearly heart-broken over the affair, and has the sympathy of all her friends.

Still another excitement was caused last Friday by the contest between the trustees of the school and the "school-master," as to which had the most authority in regard to the use of the school house outside of school hours. One of the trustees had told the young people of the place they might have a dance in the school house at any time they wished to. His step-son being another of the trustees, they had the permission of two. The young people therefore made preparations for a dance, never thinking of any objection to it, invited guests from the neighboring towns, had refreshments prepared, music engaged, and everything in readiness for the dance, which had been announced for Friday evening last, not thinking it necessary to obtain the permission of the school-master (who, by the way, is very much opposed to dancing), as he is supposed to have jurisdiction over the school house only during school hours and never in opposition to the trustees and the people of the district. But this particular school-master ranged himself in opposition to the whole community, and proposed to show how much power he could exercise; therefore when the keys were politely and innocently requested, he absolutely refused to give them up, and informed the young people if they wished to dance they would have to dance in the belfry, as he was the only one that had the keys to the inner doors, (the trustees having the keys to the outer door only) and he should lock them securely on that night, which he did. He refused to deliver the keys after receiving an order from all three trustees. But of course the people were not going to be dictated to in regard to their own school house by a "servant of the people" in such a fashion. Therefore, immediately after the close of school the friendly trustees went with the young men and easily opened all the doors with a skeleton key. They entered, removed the seats, swept the house clean all over, put up lamps, waxed the floor, and made all necessary or desirable preparations. In the evening a company of the most respectable people of the place gathered there and enjoyed an orderly and refined dancing party; fathers, mothers, sons and daughters were there, and everything passed off pleasantly. All enjoyed the evening highly, the dance breaking up at 12 o'clock. The next day the seats were replaced, floors swept, and everything left in good order. Nevertheless, on Monday morning the school-master felt called upon to give his pupils a long dissertation upon the "evils of dancing." Thus you see even a small place like this cannot entirely avoid unpleasantness when opposing thoughts and influences meet.
