THEIR METHODS CONDEMNED. An Open Letter to Mr. Clarkson by a Republican. A Los Angeles man writes the following letter to Mr. Clarkson, first-assistant postmaster-general, appearing in the New York World April 29, 1890: DEAR SEN—I see it quoted in a reputable eastern daily that the removals thus far by this administration number about 38,000. In another column of the same paper the startling announcement is made that you have thus far removed 34,000 fourth-class postmasters. Perhaps even this assumption of seventeen-nineteenths of the reins of government (as at present understood) would not have impelled me to write this letter had you not allowed your axe to fall so near home. Among the heads that have recently dropped into your basket is that of Robert E. Nathan, postmaster at Azusa, Los Angeles county, Cal., who was appointed about twenty-one months ago by your predecessor, Don M. Dickinson. The younger democrats and the leading republicans stood sponsor for Mr. Nathan as against the old-timers, represented by the postmaster then in office. Mr. Nathan's bondsmen were republicans, and 90 per cent. of the patrons of the office not long ago petitioned you for his retention. He has made an exemplary official, being an educated and honorable man, well qualified for the position. In the face of all this you have appointed to succeed him a man who neither contributed one dime nor uttered one word for the success of our party, and it is a question as to how he cast his last vote. Now, had it been necessary or expedient to have made a change in our office how much more excusable it would have been had you appointed another applicant, a veteran and a grand army brother of yours. This would, at least, have been some mitigation for your action, and there would have been some semblance of party consistency in it. All these facts were laid before you, but, no doubt, in your great deprecation at you have neither time nor inclination to inquire into the separate merits of the different applicants. All that seems to concern you is the fact that the head that falls is a democrat's. If it was at the dictation of our senate and Mexico-absorbing congressman, General William Vandever, that you gave your axe an extra sharpening in order to aid that legislator to obtain a re-nomination, you both have certainly counted without

your host, as even were that honor secured it would result in the election of a democrat to succeed him. If you will exercise your memory you will find that it was this wholesale removal of competent officials for factional partisan purposes that gave birth to the "mugwumps" and elected Cleveland, a comparatively unknown man, over America's greatest statesman, James G. Blaine, in 1884. Now, I cannot believe, although it is confidently asserted in some quarters, that one so conscientious as President Harrison elevated you to your present position for the purpose of doing the administration's dirty work, nor do I believe that your promiscuous quill-driving meets even the approval of the head of your department, as Mr. Wannaker has let it be understood that he intends to carry out the civil-service plank in our national platform. The postmaster-general is an honorable man, and the records show that he, together with the rest of the administration, has thus far only availed himself of two-ninths of the "public crib," while you have wallowed in the remainder. As a politician, when the boot was on the other leg, you helped denounce the Cleveland administration for its disregard of civil service reform, while now, in dead men's shoes, you make such reform a mockery. "Oh, consistency, thou art a jewel!"

Regardless of another tenet of the party of Lincoln, viz., home rule, you make appointments in conflict with the wishes of the republican constituents at your own or political favorite's dictation. Were the balance of the administration guilty of such practices, it is a question whether the republican party would ever survive another election. The "bloody shirt" has lost its efficacy as a battle standard, both parties are divided on the tariff question, and there is no other distinct issue before the people than this one of civil service reform.

How can we conscientiously ask the support of intelligent voters for another year, through such self-seeking officials as you, the records show were instrumental in elevating you and others as by nature and choice best fitted. Very respectfully, HENRY C. ROBERTS. Azusa, Cal., March 29, 1890.
