THE ROAD TO DEMOCRATIC VICTORY.

There is a road to Democratic victory in the United States just now that is so clearly indicated that ordinary landmarks are blotted out.

Governor Hill has really been a chivalrous Democrat. When, in 1880, President Arthur peremptorily dictated the selection of Judge Folger, his secretary of the treasury, as the Republican candidate for governor, the question arose as to whether the federal government should be the dictator in all concerns, state and national.

In that election Mr. Cleveland was chosen governor by the largest majority ever received by a candidate for chief magistrate of any state.

That fact had not conspicuously demonstrated the exceptional strength of the present governor of New York, later events would have put it beyond peradventure.

But while these railroad men mean just what they say about not intending to build beyond Milford just now, they don't mean that their extension will stop at Milford, nor that the progress of their road south of that point is to be stayed even for a day.

That there was nothing unusual in Mr. Hill's run in the empire state when he was associated with Cleveland was shown by the tremendous vote he received in 1888.

That Governor Hill can carry the state of New York goes without saying. Whether the admirable ex-president could or no is an open question, because he has a great number of enemies, among whom are such men as ex-Mayors Cooper, Grace and Hewitt, and he has been beaten once.

There has never been an instance in the political history of the United States in which a man who has been once defeated for president was ever elected again.

Probably in 1896 New York will not determine the result of the presidential election, but in 1892 she undoubtedly will. Hill can carry this pivotal state.

Hon. J. V. COLEMAN is actively in the field for the Democratic nomination for governor. He arrived here yesterday from San Luis Obispo and intervening

counties. Mr. Coleman has many friends here who will give him the full extent of their support. If he gets the Democratic nomination, he will make a splendid run, for he has a fine record, is recognized as a strong and able leader, and enjoys a personal popularity throughout the state second to that of no man whose name has yet been mentioned in connection with the nomination.

THEY SAY ONE THING AND DO ANOTHER.

THE STRIKE WAVE.

THE MONTH OF MAY MEMORABLE IN LABOR ANNALS.

An Unprecedented Number of Strikes Occurring—Thus Far the Strikers in the Main Have Been Successful.

New York, May 30.—Bradstreet's says: The month now drawing to a close will go on record as one in which an unprecedented number of strikes took place.

Up to Thursday of this week there were 243 strikes, involving 67,507 persons, reported since May 1st. For the five months of the present year, the contrast furnished with similar periods of late years is a striking one, and we have to go back to the great 1886-7 strike wave for a like exhibit.
