PETITIONS.

Those Received by the Council Yesterday.

The following petitions were received by the council yesterday and referred to the proper committees:

From L. J. Kelly asking for an extension of thirty days to complete his contract on the Pine-street school building.

From Julius Lyons and others protesting against the construction of a sewer on Waters street, between Temple street and Bellevue avenue, and Bellevue avenue, between Waters street and East Edgeware road.

From the Los Angeles orphans' home, by Mrs. William Ferguson, tendering to the city as a part of its sewerage system all that sewer commencing at the east line of Yale street and running westerly on Alpine street 199 feet, the said orphans' home relinquishing to said city any and all claims whatever for building said sewer.

From Purcell & Chambers and Eugene Germain asking that for the present they be not required to construct a cement sidewalk on Fourth street, between Main and Los Angeles streets, as it is their intention to commence the erection of business blocks upon their property next fall.

From Maurice S. Hellman, asking that a new deed be executed on behalf of said city and delivered to him of lot 4, block 11, Ord's survey.

From C. E. Huber, asking that no action be taken towards laying a cement sidewalk on Broadway, between Eighth and Ninth streets, in front of his property, until October 1st next.

From Jessie Watson, asking that the irrigation water pipe from reservoir No. 4, across the rear of lot No. 27, of G. W. King's subdivision in block 22, be removed and said lot refilled.

From Charles Lantz, asking that the zanjero be ordered to place over the mouth of the zanja pipe on Fourth street, between Colyton and Carolina streets, (zanja No. 2), an iron grating with interstices not greater than two inches apart, as now it is a great menace to the lives of children who live over it.

From Stephen Nicoletti, asking permission to put a water trough in front of his premises on the southwest corner of New High and Walters streets.

From J. C. McMenomy, protesting against the acceptance of the cement sidewalk on the west side of Hill street, between Eighth and Ninth streets, in front of his property.

From Eliza Griffin, objecting to the assessment upon his lot No. 14, block 20, subdivision of lot 2, block 39, Hancock's survey, for the grading of Bellevue avenue, and asking that her objections be heard.

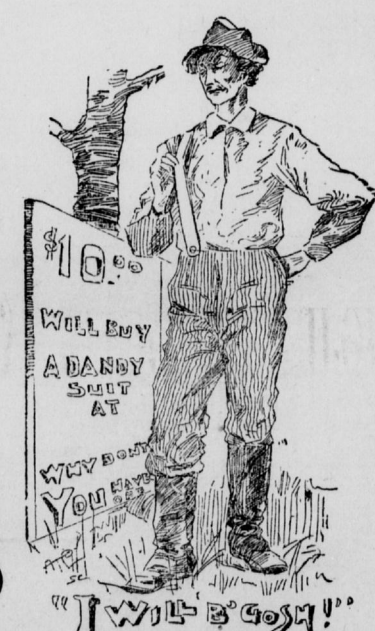
