

CHAUTAUQUAN SPORT

A Programme Arranged for the Summer.

Indoor Exhibitions and Outside Contests.

Football, Baseball, Tennis, and Bicycle Racing.

All Kinds of Races for Which Entries Will Be Made—Prizes to be Awarded the Winners.

The Chautauqua Society has determined to make its summer meeting at Redondo quite attractive this year. It has decided to have outdoor sports and inside gymnasium exhibitions, the entries for which will close July 20th.

The following events will be held indoors at the Chautauqua Assembly amphitheater on the afternoons of August 7th and 12th, 1890, and will be contested in the order given: August 7th—Club swinging, fence vault, foil fencing, standing high jump, parallel bars, standing high kick, horizontal bar. August 12th—Tumbling, running, high jump, putting the shot, hitch and kick, rope climbing, trapeze, tug of war.

The events headed club swinging, parallel bars, horizontal bar, tumbling, rope climbing and trapeze will be given as exhibitions, and competent judges will award the prizes to those giving the finest exhibition.

The outdoor field day will be August 1st, and held on the Redondo athletic field, the programme being arranged as follows:

- Bicycle race, one-quarter mile. Foot race, 100 yards dash. Standing broad jump. Sack race, 100 yards. Bicycle race, one-half mile. Running broad jump. Foot race, 220 yards. Pole vault. Three-legged race. Bicycle race, three miles. Throwing the hammer. Potato race, fifty yards and fifty potatoes. Foot race, one-half mile. Throwing the baseball. Hurdle race, 120 yards, ten hurdles 3 1/2 feet high; fifteen yards to first hurdle and ten yards between remaining hurdles. Cycle race, one mile. Bicycles, tricycles, safeties, stars—in fact, anything on wheels and propelled by man is included in this class.

The final championship game of football will be played on the Redondo athletic field, on the afternoon of August 5th, and that of baseball on the afternoon of August 9th. Prior to these dates the preliminary games will be played, and under the same regulation as that of tug-of-war; that is, if two teams enter, games will be played, best two out of three; and if three teams enter, first game one and two will play, then two and three, and then three and one. If four teams enter, one and two will play, then three and four, and the winners play the final. The tennis will be, gent's singles, gent's doubles, and gentleman and lady, as partners, in doubles. The final championship sets will be played as follows: Gent's singles on the afternoon of August 12th, gent's doubles on the forenoon of August 13th, and gentleman and lady in doubles on the afternoon of August 13th. The preliminaries will be played on the forenoons of August 5th, 7th and 9th; other dates will be arranged, if necessary, according to the number of entries.

As an inducement to all who wish to compete in the above-named events and contests, elegant and costly prizes, consisting of penants, urns and medals, richly engraved and representing as near as possible the event for which they are to be given, will be awarded.

It is to be understood that contests of all kinds held at Redondo this season under the management of the Chautauqua Assembly will be for the championship of Southern California, and entries will therefore be taken with that understanding.

The following rules have been adopted to govern the events:

Rule 1. No person will be permitted to compete for a prize in any event who is known to be other than an "amateur."

Definition: An amateur is any person who never competed in an open competition, or for a stake, or for public money, or for gate money, or under a false name, or with a professional for a prize, nor has at any period of his life taught or pursued athletic exercises as a means of livelihood.

Rule 2. Each contestant will make one attempt in all events in the order of his name on the programme; then those who fail, if any, shall have a second trial in regular order, and those failing in this trial shall then take their third and final trial.

Rule 3. No jumps or artificial aid will be allowed in any jumping contest, except by special agreement or announcement.

Rule 4. In any event a competitor may omit his trial at any height, but if he fails at the next height he shall not be allowed to go back and try the height he omitted.

Rule 5. All races will be started by pistol shot. Any competitor starting before the signal will be put back one yard; for a second offense, another, and for a third offense, disqualified. Any competitor will be disqualified for willfully jostling, running across, or in any way impeding another during a race.

Rule 6. When ordered into position for a start, the men shall mount their machines, and one assistant of each competitor will hold his machine with its front wheel at the mark; at the starting signal the attendants are allowed to push the machine forward, but not to follow it up.

Rule 7. The judges shall caution for any unfair walking, and the third caution shall disqualify the offender. The last lap an unfair walker shall be disqualified without previous caution.

COURT MATTERS.

Chormicle and Gardener Dismissed on the Second Charge.

In department 6 of the superior court yesterday morning the second case against W. C. Chormicle and W. A. Gardener was dismissed by Judge Shaw, on motion of Assistant District Attorney McComas, on the ground that the evidence was insufficient to secure a conviction, and both defendants were finally discharged and their bondsmen exonerated. They will leave for their homes in the Cascades this afternoon.

In the same court yesterday morning José Condi appeared before Judge Shaw with his counsel, and entered a demurrer against the information charging him with having stolen half a ton of coal from the New Mexico Coal Company, an offense which, on account of his having been previously convicted of larceny in Arizona, ranked as a felony instead of a misdemeanor. His plea of not guilty having been withdrawn, to admit of the filing of the demurrer, the matter was argued pro and con, but the court overruled the demurrer and ordered the defendant to appear for trial this morning.

The trial calendar will be called in department 6 on Saturday morning next.

The case against James A. McCusker, who is charged with the forgery of the firm name of H. P. Gregory & Co., to an order for the payment of rebate taxes upon the city treasurer, was to have been tried in department 1 of the superior court yesterday, but as the prosecution was not ready to proceed the cause was transferred to department 6 to be reset.

In Justice Lockwood's court yesterday D. P. Flora, F. M. Culvert, L. F. Standcliff and John Johnson appeared for arraignment upon the charge of maliciously injuring a water ditch belonging to Thomas Riley at Tejujunga on the 12th inst. Their cases were set for trial on the 26th inst. at 2 o'clock p. m., until which time they were released upon bonds in the sum of \$200 each.

The case of James O. Dall against Sheriff Aguirre to recover \$20,000 for false imprisonment, is on trial before Judge Clark. The case grew out of the tar-and-feather episode at San Pedro about a year ago. Dall was arrested and locked up in the county jail, and alleges that he was damaged in the sum named.

Judge Van Dyke yesterday granted a divorce to Lucy E. Rogers from John Rogers on the ground of desertion.




