

CHAUTAUQUA.

WHAT WILL BE DONE AT REDONDO THIS YEAR.

The Programs of the Events—Lectures, Concerts and a Number of Athletic Competitions Arranged.

The Chautauqua season for this year opens at Redondo July 29th, and continues until August 15th. The general programme is said to be one of unusual excellence. There are to be concerts by cultivated artists, lectures by travelers, humorists, scholars, educators, teachers and preachers; tableaux of oriental lands and scenes, the costumes alone of such elegance that it has cost \$2,000 to make the proper representations; drills and talks on Sunday school; normal work by leading instructors in this field; orchestral concerts on a scale not before attempted in Southern California and piano and organ recitals.

Among the prominent lectures to be delivered are the following: "The Four Napoleons," illustrated, by Mr. C. E. Bolton; "The Shaw Family," "Reunited Germany and Heroic Louise," by C. E. Bolton, in illustrations. Mr. Bolton will deliver other lectures also upon "Russia and Romanoffs" and "Lands of the Midnight Sun." "The Blind Man Eloquent," or Dr. W. H. Milburn, the blind chaplain of the United States house of representatives, will deliver five of his lectures: "What a Blind Man Saw in England," "What a Blind Man Saw in Washington Forty Years Ago and What He Sees There Now," "The Mouth of Gold," "What a Blind Man Saw in Paris." Mr. Milburn will also preach one or two sermons during the session of the assembly. "Military Genius," is the title of a lecture by General L. A. Sheldon, to be given August 12th. John De Witt Miller will lecture on "The Uses of Ugliness," August 2d, "Love, Courtship and Marriage," August 4th; "The Stranger at Our Gates," August 5th, and "Distinguished Men I Have Met" on August 6th; closing with "Some Contemptible Characters" on August 8th. "The Life and Times of Thomas Jefferson" is the subject of an able lecture by Stephen Bowers, Ph. D. Colonel Homer B. Spray, Ph. D., the soldier, scholar and literatus, speaks on "John Milton," "Riches and Shakespeare." In addition to these popular lectures, Dr. W. H. Pendleton gives three lectures on scriptural study and interpretation; Rev. Dr. A. J. Frost three lectures on the book of Hebrews; Dr. David Reed, likewise three lectures on Biblical themes; Rev. Dr. M. H. Du Bose conducts a course of lectures on the symbolism of the Bible as traced in (1) "Truth in Sacred Architecture," (2) "Truth in Figures of Prophecy," (3) "Truth in the Parables."

Professor Henry Ludlum will direct a school of oratory and elocution, one department of which is designed especially for the study of sacred oratory or pulpit elocution.

The assembly offers two grand prizes for the best examination of the gospel of Luke, one of one hundred dollars and one of fifty dollars. In addition, all who obtain a percentage of over seventy-five receive a handsome diploma as a reward of merit.

C. L. S. C. Round Table. The assembly is aligned with the Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle, whose headquarters are at Lake Chautauqua, New York. This is the great "people's university," from which the toiling young men and women, whose means will not permit them to attend a college, may graduate with a ripe and ready knowledge of the great truths of science and literature. The Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle will conduct daily exercises of lectures, "conversations," scientific experiments, etc.

August 14th is "Recognition day," when all Chautauquans in Southern California who have finished their course will receive their diplomas. Rev. H. M. Du Bose, superintendent of the Chautauqua Assembly of Texas, is superintendent of the Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle.

Daily instruction will be given in Spanish, French and German. Prof. Carlos Bransly is principal and professor of Spanish, assisted by Mrs. H. M. Cobb, teacher in French.

L. E. Garden-Macloed conducts classes in preliminary and advanced subjects. "Ben Hur" will be represented by twelve character tableaux, with appropriate scenery, costumes and lights, and songs by "Tirzah" and "Iras;" also, recitations in costumes of extracts from the book, including "The Falling Tile," "The Chariot Race," "The Healing of the Lepers;" dialogue between Arrius and Ben Hur, on the galley deck. About seventy-five characters will be used in the tableaux. The management will spare neither pains nor expense, and have engaged Prof. Henry Ludlum, of Los Angeles, to take charge of the production.

Hugo Mansfield, a pianist, has been engaged to play at the concerts.

Sports. The following sports will be held indoors at the Chautauqua assembly amphitheater, on the afternoon of August 7 and 12, 1889, and will be contested in the order given:

August 7th—Club swinging, fence vault, foil fencing, standing high jump, parallel bars, standing high kick, horizontal bar.

August 12th—Tumbling, running high jump, putting the shot, hitch and kick, rope climbing, trapeze, tug of war.

Out-Door Sports. The out-door field day will be August 1st, and held on the Redondo athletic field, the programme being arranged as follows: Bicycle race, one-quarter mile; foot race, one hundred yards dash; standing broad jump; sack race, one hundred yards; bicycle race, one-half mile; running broad jump; foot race, one hundred and twenty yards; pole vault; three-legged race; bicycle race, three miles; throwing the hammer, potato race, fifty yards and fifty potatoes; foot race, one-half mile; throwing the baseball; walking match, one-half mile; hurdle race, one hundred and twenty yards, ten hurdles, three and one-half feet high, fifteen yards to first hurdle, and ten yards between remaining hurdles; cycle race, one mile, bicycles, tricycles, safeties, stars, in fact anything on wheels and propelled by man is included in this class.

The final championship game of football will be played on the Redondo athletic field, on the afternoon of August 5th, and that of baseball on the afternoon of August 9th.

Special programmes will be issued from time to time, giving in detail the concerts, recitals and contests.

Professor A. H. Benham, of San Francisco, will direct the music of the assembly and conduct the choir.

The grand opening will occur on July 29th. This occasion will be made brilliant with music, fireworks, etc.






