Double Ball Games to Celebrate the Fourth.

Results of Contests on the Eastern Diamonds.

Salvator Withdraws from the Ocean Stakes at Monmouth.

CHICAGO, July 4.—The Chicago (brotherhood) defeated the New Yorks this morning in the presence of 8,500 people. A high wind prevented heavy batting.

Score—Chicago, 3; New York, 1. In the afternoon 13,500 people witnessed an exciting contest. The home team won in the eleventh innings.

Score—Chicago, 4; New York, 2. Boston, July 4.—Eight thousand people attended today's Buffalo-Boston (brotherhood) games. Both games were loosely played. The first game was called at the end of the sixth innings on account of the bad condition of the grounds.

Morning Game—Boston, 6; Buffalo, 6. CLEVELAND, July 4.—At Brotherhood park wet grounds made errors numerous at this morning's game. Neither pitcher was hit hard. The attendance was 1,500.

Score—Cleveland, 8; Philadelphia, 7. The hard hitting of the Philadelphia, combined with the wretched fielding of the home team, gave the visitors an easy victory this afternoon. Attendance, 6,000.

Score—Cleveland, 6; Philadelphia, 15. Pittsburgh, July 4.—About 6,000 people witnessed this morning's brotherhood game, which was hotly contested. A passed ball in the ninth and a single by Van Hatten gave the game to the locals.

Brennan Dies From the Effects of His Fall—Other Sloggers. CHICAGO, July 4.—William Brennan, the lightweight pugilist, who was injured in a sparring match last night with Frank Garrard, died at 4 o'clock this morning.

RIFLEMEN IN BERLIN.

Minister Phelps Delivers a Spread-Eagle Speech at their Banquet. BERLIN, July 4.—The American riflemen today gave a concert and afterward a brilliant banquet at Kaiserhof. Among the guests were United States Minister Phelps and wife, Walter Damosch and wife, ex-Comptroller John Jay Knox, the leading residents and a number of noted German marksmen. Mr. Phelps, speaking to a toast to President Harrison, said that America's danger arose from her immense material prosperity. President Harrison ruled the richest and strongest nation on the globe. From his lofty station he saw more clearly than any one else the full sweep of this incredible prosperity. He was neither dazzled nor shaken. He kept his poise rugged and firm as Washington, shunning the tempting paths of popularity, keeping the puritan simplicity of our fathers' days, and having no aspirations other than his surroundings—a character greater than success. Referring to the estimate that \$150,000,000 was spent by Americans yearly traveling in Europe, he said that although nothing the customs houses can show was a return reward, yet there was certain reward in the ampler knowledge and experience gained which Americans turn to use. Alluding to American home life as the sweetest and purest on earth, the speaker said that he thought, however, that travelers would find that the Germans made their home life fuller, taking their families into their pleasures and amusements, and many taking them into their business.
