Pensions and Politics. Senator Vest, of Missouri, in protesting against the passage of the dependent pensions bill, drew attention to the prostitution of this noble benefaction to partisan uses in the following striking remarks:

Take the last report of the commissioner of pensions, and what does it show? Indiana furnished in the war 195,147 soldiers; Illinois, lying side by side, furnished 258,211. Indiana has upon the pension roll 42,553 pensioners, while Illinois has but 36,595.

Read the report of the examining committees and the evidence taken when Dudley was commissioner of pensions and you will find the solution. You will find that it was declared and it was acted upon, "Give pensions freely, liberally; every man that you can pension is to be induced to vote the Republican ticket."

Mr. President, I care not what plausible excuse may be made, I say that I believe from this and other evidence—and the conviction is steadily growing upon the honest men of this country—that this pension bureau is being used for political purposes, and that the general feeling of the United States towards the soldiers who preserved the government is being prostituted to partisan purposes.
