A Marriage Ceremony That Was Not Legal.

Trial of the Parties Charged in the Case.

A Young Girl Dies Suddenly at Redondo Beach.

Reported Murder at Indio—What a Visitor Thinks About Los Angeles.

In department 6 of the superior court yesterday, T. A. Brooks appeared before Judge Shaw and a jury upon a charge of rape, alleged to have been committed upon Anna Caskey, of Santa Monica, on April 1st last.

The complainant, Anna Caskey, deposed that she was 13 years of age, and resided with her mother. That on Friday evening, April 1st, she left her mother's residence and visited the house of a friend named Agnes Collins, and remained there for some time.

At 7:30 o'clock, according to a preconcerted arrangement, she met a young man named Tom A. Brooks, and was driven by him to Los Angeles in a buggy. A halt was made at Washington gardens, and it being a moonlight night they sat in one of the moonlight houses, where they were joined by Seward Smith, or some one who looked like him, and a young man named Rockford, whom she supposed to be a clergyman.

Mrs. E. Caskey, the mother of the girl, deposed that her daughter was born on December 25, 1877. She had not given her consent to the marriage of her daughter, who had gone out on April 1st and left home. That she was married in Gainsboro, Pa., and had lived in this state about eighteen months. Her husband was an inmate of Ogden hospital at present, and knew nothing of the trouble. The girl was never baptised in any church and there was no record of her birth, but she was quite sure of the date.

A VISITOR'S VIEWS.

R. S. Wilson Thinks There Should be More Factories Here.

R. S. Wilson, of Eau Claire, Wisconsin, is visiting Los Angeles, with which he is very much pleased. He stated yesterday to a HERALD reporter that he believed that in the course of time Los Angeles would be the equal of San Francisco. He visited the latter place a year ago and was not much impressed with its importance.

He mentioned one case where \$10,000 in land had been given to a manufacturer of folding beds to establish his works. Today the folding beds were to be found in the Los Angeles market. There was no reason, he thought, why the folding beds could not be made here as cheaply as in his town.

M. Soto is interested in the Mojave-river Water Company, which is preparing to take out the water and irrigate the land for a hundred miles down the country, including Calico, Daggett and other mining districts.

KILLING AT INDIOS.

M. Soto Shot by a Mexican in a Row.

A dispatch received yesterday at the Southern Pacific general offices from Indio announces that last Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock a Mexican named Jose Carreras shot another named M. Soto. Soto lived only about three hours. The ball entered his back near the kidneys. Both men were perfectly sober. They were employed as section men. The trouble was said to be over some woman. The shooting occurred in front of the section house. The coroner and sheriff from Banning arrived last evening and an investigation will be made today. Carreras was placed under arrest.

DIED SUDDENLY.

A Young Girl Expires at Redondo Beach.

The sudden death of Aggie Throop, a 14-year-old girl, at Redondo Beach was reported last evening. It is stated that the girl has been in poor health for some time past, her heart being out of order. Yesterday she retired to a small room, and some one heard moans shortly afterward. An investigation

was made and Aggie was found in convulsions. She was immediately removed to her room and medical aid summoned, but she died shortly afterward.

WILLING TO SUFFER.

Two Holiness Band Men Convicted in the Police Court.

In the police court yesterday afternoon, B. F. Elliott and G. D. Mealy were convicted by Justice Austin of having disturbed the peace on the corner of Downey avenue and Freeman streets, and both were remanded to jail in default of bonds to secure their appearance for sentence in court this morning. From the testimony adduced it was shown that the Holiness Band, of which the defendants are members, was holding an open-air service on the corner of the streets above mentioned, and that the choir of the band was interrupted by a number of small boys, who joined in the singing of the hymns. When the band stopped its singing the boys began anew, and this so enraged Elliott and Mealy that they rushed at their tormentors, and catching one, a boy named Hackett, threw him down on the ground and beat him. At this juncture Deputy Sheriff Pete Reel, attracted by the boy's cries, went up to the men and told them to desist, at the same time making known to them his authority by showing his badge. Instead of doing so, however, they turned upon Reel, and one of them struck him a violent blow on the head with a torch he was carrying, inflicting a nasty cut. The arrival of Officer Conlee saved further trouble, as he placed both under arrest. When leaving the dock for the jail both defendants announced their willingness to "suffer for Christ's sake."

RAILWAY NOTES.

Fast Freight Time on the Santa Fe Route.

Advices received in this city yesterday announce the arrival in Denver of a carload of green apricots, having been on the road from Los Angeles only ninety-eight hours. Two cars of apricots and peaches from San Bernardino also arrived in Chicago yesterday morning, being the morning of the sixth day from date of shipment. The fruit was in excellent condition and found a ready market at large figures. The first car of dried apricots for this season, left for Chicago yesterday over the Santa Fe and will doubtless arrive at their destination in six days. This is remarkably fast freight time and enables the fruit-grower to dispose of his products in an eastern market at good prices, without possibility of loss from long delays on the road.

No. 20, the overland from the east on the Southern Pacific, arrived in this city yesterday evening eight or nine hours late. The delay was caused by washouts east of Tucson.

APPLES AS MEDICINE.

They Were Highly Thought of in the Early Days and Much Used.

The apple is composed of vegetable fiber, albumen, sugar gum, chlorophyl, malic acid, gallic acid, lime and much water. The German analysts declare that the apple contains a larger percentage of phosphorus than any other fruit or vegetable. This phosphorus is admirably adapted for renewing the essential nervous matter, lethicin of the brain and spinal cord. Old Scandinavian legends or traditions represent the apple as the food of the gods, who, when they found themselves growing feeble and infirm, resorted to this fruit to renew the powers of the mind and body.

Judging from these traditions, apples must have been highly thought of in ancient times, and their restorative qualities understood, says a writer in the Ladies' World. The acids of the apple are of great use to people of sedentary habits whose livers are sluggish in action; they eliminate from the body noxious matters which, if retained, would make the brain heavy and dull, and bring about jaundice or skin eruptions, and other allied troubles. Some such experience must have led to the custom of taking apple sauce with roast pork, rich goose and like dishes. The malic acid of ripe apples, either raw or cooked, will neutralize any excess of chalky matter engendered by eating too much meat.

It is also the fact that such fresh fruits as the apple, the pear and the plum, taken when ripe, and without sugar, diminish the acidity of the stomach rather than provoke it. Their vegetable salts and juices are converted into alkaline carbonates, which tend to correct acidity. A good ripe, raw apple is one of the easiest of vegetable substances for the stomach to deal with, the whole process of digestion being complete in eighty-five minutes. A portion of rotten apples is said to be an excellent remedy for weak, rheumatic eyes. In the French hospitals an apple poultice is applied to inflamed eyes, the apple being roasted and the pulp applied directly to the eyes—that is, without the intervention of any cloth or substance. A modern maxim teaches that "To eat an apple going to bed, The doctor then will beg his bread."
