Assignment of Teachers for the Coming Term.

The Schools at Which They Will Teach.

Class Rooms Provided for All the Children in the City.

Several Matters Connected with the New School Buildings Considered—Other Business Transacted.

At the regular meeting of the board of education, held last night in the city hall, there were present Messrs. Cox, Ellis, Frew, Gosper, Woodbury, McIntosh, Powers and Whaling, and in the absence of President A. E. Pomeroy, who is spending a vacation with his family at Lake Tahoe, the chair was occupied by Mr. C. J. Ellis.

A number of applications for appointment as janitors in the public schools were received and referred to the janitors' committee.

The resignation of Miss M. E. Quayle, a teacher, was accepted with regrets, on motion of Mr. Powers.

The usual number of demands, amounting in the aggregate to \$1,413.73, were approved in accordance with the recommendation of the finance committee.

A communication was received from the city clerk transmitting the matter of the alleged grievances claimed by the citizens of Boyle Heights, for investigation by the board. Referred to the building committee.

Communications were received from F. S. Clark and E. A. Pickard, offering to purchase buildings on the Amelia-street and Eighth-street school lots, and both were referred to the building committee.

The offer of Mrs. Alice Marlette to sell four lots adjoining the San Pedro-street school for \$2,500 was also referred to the same committee.

On motion of Mr. Ellis, of the teachers' committee, Miss Belle McFadden was elected as a teacher in the public schools.

Mr. McIntosh, of the building committee, made the following recommendations:

The petition of C. G. Williams, contractor for the Second and Beaudry-street school building, for an extension of time of thirty days, be granted. Adopted.
That the old building at Seventh street be allowed to remain where it now stands, within six feet of the foundation of the new building, and that it be sold when the board receives a reasonable bid for it. Adopted.
That the little cottage on the Amelia-street school lot be sold to Mrs. Prichard on the terms proposed by her, and that the secretary prepare an agreement for her to sign, and request that the building be removed as soon as possible to enable the work on the other building to proceed. Adopted.
That the secretary be instructed to advertise for bids for the addition of two rooms to the San Pedro-street school, the bids to include the removal of the present building to the center of the lot, and the material on the lot to be used in the foundation of the new building. Adopted.
That the president and secretary be authorized to sign the demand for the San Pedro street lot as soon as the deed is presented and the certificate of title is continued to date, to enable the board to commence the removal of the building to its proper place.
This recommendation gave rise to a lengthy discussion, which resulted, however in its adoption by a vote of 6 to 1, Mr. Powers refusing to vote and Mr. Whaling being in the negative.
That all school sites hereafter purchased be not less than 150 feet front by 150 feet in depth, or 200 feet in depth, if possible. Adopted.
That water tanks be placed in the tower of the new high school building, and if bids have not already been received for the electrical appliances, the secretary be instructed to advertise for the same. Adopted.
That the secretary advertise for bids for the supply of blinds in all school buildings not now furnished with the same, and that home manufacturers shall have the preference. Adopted.
That the secretary be instructed to advertise for bids for the addition of four rooms to the Breed-street school building. Adopted.
That the report of the chief janitor be received and filed for future reference. Adopted.
Several other unimportant matters having been disposed of, the board adjourned until Monday evening next.


