Resolutions Scoring Senator Stanford Adopted.

Hon. S. M. White Endorsed for the Senate.

Delegates Selected to Go to the State Convention.

Hon. J. DeBarth Shorb Elected Chairman of the County Committee—A New Committee Selected.

The Democratic county convention assembled yesterday morning in Turn Verein hall for the purpose of selecting forty-seven delegates for the state convention to be held next month. The interest in the proceedings was unusually great, for the reason that rumors were flying around to the effect that there were two factions that would probably contest for the supremacy. As early as half-past 9 o'clock the major portion of the delegation from the city was on hand, and from that time until 10 o'clock the members from the interior cities dropped in one by one. Shortly before 10 o'clock J. Marion Brooks asked all those in favor of the nomination of E. B. Pond for governor to assemble in one of the ante-rooms. What transpired in the room was not divulged, for the doors were closed to the general public. The delegates from the fourth supervisory district also held a caucus, and decided to place the name of C. R. Redick before the convention for temporary chairman. These meetings delayed the calling of the convention to order about fifteen minutes, but when order was finally restored from the confusion which is always attendant upon the assembling of a convention, it was observed that the hall was crowded both back of the delegation and in the gallery. Some of the Republican leaders and wire-pullers were noted among the crowd, taking a deep interest in the affairs of the convention. Besides these there were a large number of representative Democrats.

The convention was called to order by Eugene Germain, chairman of the county central committee, who instructed the secretary of the same committee, W. S. Waters, to read the call for the convention. After this had been done the chair announced that nominations for temporary chairman were in order.

Judge Eaton said he desired to place before the convention the name of a young Democrat who would fill the position with credit to the party and himself. He named C. R. Redick.

Judge A. M. Stephens nominated Hon. J. DeBarth Shorb.

Captain A. F. Mackay seconded the nomination of Mr. Redick.

N. A. Covarrubias seconded the nomination of Hon. J. DeBarth Shorb, as also did Major Burke.

M. T. Brewer seconded the nomination of Mr. Redick, and the nominations were declared closed.

T. McCaffrey moved that the vote be taken by delegations, but some objections being made the chair ordered a roll call to decide as to whether the delegations should vote *in* or *in* person. The motion was unanimously carried after its import had been explained.

The chair appointed Messrs. W. C. Marshall and Phil Stein tellers, and the roll call showed 169 votes for Hon. J. DeBarth Shorb and 109 votes for C. R. Redick, the city, with the exception of the fifth and sixth wards, voting almost solidly for Mr. Shorb, and a number of votes being cast from county precincts the same way.

Mr. Redick moved that the election of Mr. Shorb be made unanimous. Carried.

The chair appointed Mr. Redick and General Forman to escort the temporary chairman-elect to the platform, and Mr. Redick introduced Mr. Shorb to the convention.

Mr. Shorb said that he did not believe in making speeches at that time, and that all he had to say was that he deeply appreciated the honor conferred upon him. He would decide the questions submitted to him to the best of his ability, and hoped that the greatest harmony would prevail. He declared nominations in order for temporary secretary, and on motion of Hon. E. F. Del Valle, A. Ramish was elected.

Motions were made and carried to the effect that committees of seven each be appointed to credentials, permanent organization and order of business, resolutions and platform.

Hon. R. F. Del Valle moved that all resolutions be referred to the committee on resolutions. Carried.

T. F. Shaw was appointed assistant secretary.

The committee respectfully recommended that the precinct of Redondo be allowed three delegates in this convention.

Resolved, That no proxies be recognized by this convention unless held by a delegate from the same ward and precinct.

The report was adopted, but immediately afterward a motion to reconsider was made, and one of the delegates from Pomona objected to the latter part of the report on the ground that it shut out one vote from Pomona.

The chair informed him that it did not shut out any vote, and the motion to reconsider was withdrawn.

The report of the committee on order of business as follows was read: Permanent Organization. Your committee on order of business and permanent organization reports as follows: First. That the temporary officers elected by this convention be made its permanent officers.

Second. That six vice-presidents of this convention be elected, and we recommend the following: C. R. Redick, Charles Forman, W. U. Masters, R. G. Brewer, A. E. Sepulveda and B. S. Eaton.

Third. Report of committee on credentials.

Fourth. Report of committee on resolutions.

Fifth. The election of seven delegates at large from this county to the state convention.

Sixth. The election of delegates to the state convention by supervisory districts, the delegates to be apportioned as follows: First supervisory district, seven delegates; second supervisory district, ten delegates; third supervisory district, seven delegates; fourth supervisory district, eight delegates; fifth

supervisory district, eight delegates. Seventh. The election of a chairman of the Democratic county central committee.

Eighth. The election of one member of the Democratic central committee by each voting precinct in the county. W. C. MARSH, Chairman. CHAS. A. BELL, H. B. WESTERMAN, A. W. BARRETT, JNO. C. MORAN.

Mr. DeCamp moved to amend the report so that the county committee be selected before the convention broke up into districts. Lost.

The report of the committee was adopted as read. A collection of 50 cents from each delegate was taken.

Mr. DeCamp moved that no one be allowed to vote unless he paid his 50 cents. Carried.

The Resolutions. Mr. Patton, of the committee on resolutions, reported as follows: Resolved, That we reaffirm our adhesion to the Democratic party and reiterate our belief that the prosperity of the United States and of the states cannot be firmly established until it returns to power. The present administration has been a failure. A depleted treasury, the imposition of unequal and oppressive taxes; the passage of coercive legislation, tolerable only in case of open rebellion; the arbitrary disregard by the speaker of the house of representatives of parliamentary rules induced by the concurrent recognition of all parties during a century abounding in great political struggles; the shameless servility displayed by the majority in the house of representatives in yielding ready obedience to the tyrannical mandates of their presiding officer; the refusal of the substantial members of that body to join the Democracy in its efforts to procure the passage of a measure permitting the free coinage of silver; the neglect of the present administration to in any manner modify an admittedly onerous tariff, suggest with more emphasis than mere words that the reins of government should be placed in safer hands.

Resolved, That the voluntary absence from his seat in the United States senate and his persistent failure to attend to the needs of his constituents demonstrated that Senator Stanford should not be re-elected. His departure to scenes of pleasure at a time when a proposed enactment materially affecting the viticultural interests of the state was being considered, resulted in the defeat of a bill which had it become a law, would have afforded substantial relief to the leading industry of our state. Senator Stanford was not elected by the people of this state nor with their consent. He has never originated or promoted any measure benefiting his constituents. The time has arrived when he should be retired, that his place may be filled by one in closer sympathy with the people.

WHEREAS, The Democratic party, in its last state platform, is already upon record demanding the enactment of a constitutional amendment providing for the election of the United States senators by a direct vote of the people; and, WHEREAS, With the present rapid concentration of wealth in the hands of a small and selfish class of corporations, trusts and individuals, the United States senate is gradually drifting further and further from sympathy with the people, and is becoming more and more a representative of those classes who draw their sustenance from laws unjust, unequal and oppressive in their operation upon the people; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That the pending election presents to the Democracy of California an opportunity of anticipating the amendment to the constitution, and in the person of Stephen M. White of presenting to the people a worthy champion of Democratic sentiment in favor of electing United States senators by a direct vote, and that this convention endorse the candidacy of Honorable Stephen M. White for United States senator, and respectfully asks that the state convention at San Jose, California, be authorized for the United States senate from California, in the event of the election of the Democratic legislature in the pending contest.

Resolved, That the people of the sixth congressional district owe it to themselves to select an active and intelligent congressman, who will devote his talents and energies to the needs of his country, and to the meddling with the affairs of a friendly neighboring republic. The best interests of this congressional district require the election of a Democrat in place of the incompetent Republican incumbent.

Resolved, That our thanks are due to Senator Hearst and Congressman Clinie for their efforts in endeavoring to obtain necessary appropriations for the improvement of our harbors and the erection of suitable buildings in this county for the proper transaction of federal business. These exertions are the more appreciated from the circumstance that the work should have been performed by the representative of the district.

Resolved, That we denounce intimidation, corruption and all improper influences in the election of our representatives to the republic. To free the franchise from existing abuses, we favor the enactment of the Australian ballot law.

With the best feeling and in the hope that they will assist us in applying the remedy, we call the attention of our Republican fellow-citizens to the signal of the officers of this city and county; the long list of penitentiaries; the novelty of the methods which have been employed in the numerous raids upon the treasury, while indicative of misapplied ability, at the same time constitute a record which is not commendatory of the wisdom displayed by the local Republican managers in the selection of their officials. A return to the less demonstrative, but yet honest methods which governed our affairs under the Democratic regime is the only complete corrective obtainable.

While that portion of the resolutions referring to Mr. White was being read, the convention broke forth into cheers, and demands were made for his appearance on the platform.

Yielding to the call, Mr. White advanced and said that he was almost overwhelmed with the reception he had received. He said: "I had before received evidence of your kindly feeling for me, but in it I recognize more than a kindly feeling toward me. It is a feeling that is favorable to me because I have become the advocate of the principle which must be carried out to emancipate the voters from the thralldom which compels them to consent to the formation of a body for which they have no vote. You all know that I have been asked to accept— to enter into the campaign in this reason, and that I replied that I was will-

ing upon the grounds I have mentioned. Immediately that class of citizens which represents capital and objects to the election of a United States senator by the people, opened their batteries on me. I tell you this to let you know that I have not entered the fight unmindful of the fact that I will have to contend against this; but I do not rely upon that which can be bought for money, but upon that support which is honestly given for the benefit of the party. I promise you that in this struggle I shall not withhold honest or true statements of facts, whomsoever they may hit. The campaign is about to open, and you know that there can be but one result to the election of a Republican legislature. The issue must be met by the election of a legislature which goes to the state's capital prepared to make some change for the better in the administration of affairs. I appeal to you that you place before the voters your neighbors in whom you have confidence. If you do this, if you give to the voters the man whom they can support, we will win the fight. I again thank you for the proudest which you have done me today. I am grateful for your esteem, and I promise you that if I am defeated the good work will go on. Individual triumph is of but little moment. It is a question of great importance whether the seats in the senate shall now be filled by those for whom the only claim is that they have been the highest bidders for cash."

The resolutions were adopted unanimously.

Delegates Selected. Mr. DeCamp moved that the rules be suspended so that he could move again to have the county central committee appointed at once. Lost.

The chair declared nominations in order for seven delegates at large.

Mr. Mitchell nominated Judge A. M. Stephens. P. M. Scott nominated J. D. Lynch. Mr. Davis nominated M. E. C. Munday.

Mr. Watkins nominated W. U. Masters. Mr. Smith seconded the nomination of Mr. Masters.

Judge Dunnington nominated J. Shirley Ward. H. C. Dillon, of Cerritos, was nominated by J. Willey.

Mr. Patton nominated J. T. Gaffey. Judge Ling nominated R. F. Del Valle. Alvin Peete nominated T. E. Rowan. Captain Barrett nominated Hon. S. M. White.

Abbot Kinney seconded the nomination of Mr. Masters. Major Burke nominated Eugene Germain.

C. R. Redick nominated J. P. Moran. Hon. R. F. Del Valle nominated Hon. J. DeBarth Shorb.

J. Shirley Ward seconded the nomination of Hon. J. DeBarth Shorb. Mr. Lantz seconded the nomination of A. M. Stephens.

Mr. Winston seconded the nomination of W. U. Masters. J. S. Hannon seconded the nomination of J. P. Moran.

Mr. Bragg seconded the nomination of J. T. Gaffey. A. E. DeCamp nominated Abbot Kinney.

The nominations were then closed. Joe Mesmer moved that the seven delegates receiving the highest number of votes be declared elected. Carried.

The following was the result of the ballot, which took an hour and a half to complete: Stephens, 175; Lynch, 155; Munday, 122; Masters, 143; Ward, 84; Gaffey, 154; Del Valle, 259; Rowan, 7; White, 267; Moran, 156; Shorb, 217; Kinney, 72; Dillon, 75; Germain, 67.

Messrs. White, Del Valle, Stephens, Lynch, Shorb, Gaffey and Moran were declared elected.

Nominations for the chairmanship of the county central committee were declared in order. Captain Barrett nominated Hon. J. DeBarth Shorb.

Several delegates from the city and county seconded the nomination. The nomination was closed and the election was made unanimous by a rising vote.

Mr. Shorb thanked the convention and said he accepted the office at considerable sacrifice, but he knew nothing but Democracy, and if he found that he could not do his duty he would ask that his place be filled.

Martin C. Marsh was elected secretary of the committee. Major Burke moved that five vice-presidents of the central committee be elected. This was declared out of order.

Judge Ling moved that the chair appoint a committee of five on transportation and headquarters. Carried, and Messrs. J. T. Gaffey, Judge Ling, A. Ramish, C. P. Kearney and M. E. C. Munday were appointed.

The various selections made by the supervisory district were adopted as a whole. Mr. Brewer moved that all proxies be held by delegates in the delegation to the state convention. Carried.
