HE KNOWS IT ALL.

Rev. John Elliott Gives Some Lurid Explanations. Rev. John A. Elliott, a Presbyterian divine, lectured last evening before a large audience in the Illinois hall. The subject of his discourse was entitled "Men before Adam," and the text was Isaiah, chapter 28, verses 13 and 14. The doctor quoted from Moses Hopkins and Chas. Lyell, to show by these scientists that the earth has existed some millions of years. He then went on to prove that various passages in the Bible refer to several races that existed before Adam was created, but that the wickedness of these races culminated in the Lord exterminating them by means of the flood. That scientists have proved that the bottom of the sea was the land occupied by these people. The doctor called these races Nephthalim, Rephaim, and the following were shown by various skeletons that have been discovered, ranging from 12 to 18 feet in stature. The doctor stated that the sons of God, as spoken of in Genesis vi-2 were members of the race of Nephthalim, and by the following verse that they were giants. Then by the twelfth and thirteenth verses of this same chapter, he showed that this race was corrupt and predicted their destruc-

tion. The doctor stated that Cain, being afraid of the Nephthalim, was marked by the Lord, (see Genesis iv-14 and 15) and wandered into the land of Nod, the land of the Nephthalim or vagabonds. Here he married one of this tribe, hence Cain's wife was a Nephthalim. The various tribes mentioned in the second chapter of Deuteronomy were members of the Rephaim. The Rephaim and Nephthalim, being destroyed by the flood, their spirits exist as the devils of our present time.

The claim was made that the Rephaim lived under the waters of the earth (Job xvi-5) and that many scientists of the present day say that the inside of the earth is inhabited.

The fact that the bible says Adam was the first man and was created out of the dust of the earth was accounted for by saying that Adam was the first man of a new race of beings, and that he was created out of dust. Dr. Elliott stated that the universal belief that Eve was tempted by the devil in the form of a snake was incorrect, and upheld Adam Clarke, the Methodist divine, in his statement that the tempter was an animal resembling a man or gorilla.
