POND DEMOCRATIC CLUB.

Perfect Organization—Twenty-one Hundred and Fifty Members.

A called meeting of the Democratic Club was held last night at the St. Elmo hotel. The report of the committee on permanent organization was received and recommended that J. Marion Brooks be made President and Daniel Newhart, Secretary. The report was unanimously adopted. The following resolutions were passed: Resolved, That in the opinion of the Pond Democratic Club of Los Angeles it is in the interest of harmony and the purity of the primary elections that the provisions of the state law should hereafter prevail at such primaries; and be it further Resolved, That the chair appoint a committee of eight members of this club to confer with like committees of other Democratic organizations on this subject. The following were appointed on said committee: Isaac Norton, Charles F. Last, James Castrucio, E. C. Bosbyshell, Joe M. Miller, John Hardwick, Capt. Carlos Cruz. Letters were read from various parts of the country favoring Mr. Pond's nomination for Governor. The canvassing committee reported 2150 members to date. All persons desiring the nomination of Mayor Pond for Governor of California were requested to call in person or send their names to the secretary Daniel Newhart at 112 south Spring street.

Arizona Washouts.

The Southern Pacific officials were again made unhappy yesterday by washouts on the line in Arizona. A sudden rain fell near Pantoma and so damaged the roadbed that the train from the east due here last night at 10 o'clock, will arrive this morning at about six. All possible measures have been taken to restore the road as soon as possible and trains will undoubtedly be on time today.

The Supervisors.

The board of supervisors yesterday endorsed the resolution of the chamber of commerce and signed the petition for the revocation of the order which removes the military headquarters of the department of Arizona from Los Angeles. The roadmaster of Los Nietos road district was allowed the use of the county pile driver. A warrant was ordered drawn in favor of W. W. James for \$250, for painting bridges.

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LIJAH'S TROUBLES.

He was too Familiar with Marshals and Chinese. The examination of Elijah Walker charged with having attempted to bribe a United States deputy marshal, by offering him \$100 to allow four Chinamen entry into the United States, came up before United States Commissioner Van Dyke yesterday. Deputy marshal A. W. Marsh testified that the first offer made by Walker was on Mexican soil, but that the bribe was tendered him again afterward in San Diego. The Commissioner took the case under advisement. The next case against Walker for aiding and abetting Chinamen to enter into the United States on July 31st near Tia Juana was then taken up and he was held to answer in \$2,000.

UGHT TO BE HUNG.

A Blackguard let off Easy by a Jury. Charles Stanley was tried yesterday in department one for the crime of having attempted to commit rape upon the person of Miss Maud Thornton at Pasadena on the evening of June 17th. The testimony of the complaining witness, who is but 16 years of age, and undersized for her age, was to the effect that when she was passing the corner of Moline avenue and Villa street the defendant, whom she did not know, ran after her and dragged her across the street. The child commenced to scream and Stanley put his hand over her mouth. He threw her down, tried to pull her through a hedge, and tore her underclothing to pieces. She caught hold of a tree when he said that unless she let go he would cut her throat. Finally Stanley became frightened at Miss Thornton's outcries and ran away. He was arrested next day. The defendant did not take the stand in his own behalf. He is a tramp. The jury found him guilty of simple assault after being out several hours. He will be sentenced on Monday.

IN TIME.

The Santa Fe will be Built to San Francisco. Judge Anson Brunson the attorney general of the Santa Fe Company in California returned on Wednesday from San Francisco where he had been on railroad business. The judge declined to give any definite information about the Santa Fe's line to San Francisco, except saying that the road would reach that point "in time," though he intimated that the matter was progressing very satisfactorily. The judge was very happy over Mr. Markham's nomination and over his return to the climate of Southern California.
