

FARMERS' UNION. Reasons Why the Farmers Should Organize for Protection. EDITORS HERALD—Being for many years past a subscriber of your valuable paper, and from its constant perusal, knowing its ever true and constant devotion to the agricultural and farming interests of our county, I take the liberty for the first time of asking a short place within your columns to say a word to the "farmers and producers" of Los Angeles county.

During the past few weeks circulars have been mailed throughout the county in the form of a "call for a county convention of the farmers and producers for the purpose of considering mainly the matter of forming a county organization of the farmers and producers and auxiliary organizations in each township with a view to our better protection and the promotion of our interests by securing fair and just remuneration for our labor and industry."

A general and cordial invitation has been accorded to the "husbandry" to assemble at Turner hall at 10 a. m. Aug. 18, 1890 to consider this movement. Now I ask our farmers and producers what are they going to do about it? There is no doubt that of all classes of men that need co-operative protection, the farmers of our county stand in the foremost rank, and, sad to say, in past years they have been the most deficient in this respect.

Of late years especially we hear the wall that there is nothing in farming—especially in cereals and producers and auxiliary organizations in each township with a view to our better protection and the promotion of our interests by securing fair and just remuneration for our labor and industry."
