The Athletic Contests to Commence Today.

Correspondence of the HERALD. On Monday evening most of the machinery for the construction of the new wharf came down, and yesterday a carload of lumber and the rest of the machinery arrived, and in a few days it is hoped to hear the noise of the pile driver.

Today will be a gala occasion here, when the Southern California tennis and polo clubs will give a series of athletic contests on the polo grounds, which are situated on Nevada avenue adjacent to the park. Many prizes have been already secured and the entries are numerous. It will undoubtedly be the event of the season and will commence promptly at 11:30 a. m. Messrs. Proctor, Woodhouse, Haigh, Barry and Machell, the gentlemen in charge, have been working constantly for days to make the affair a success and are very much elated over the assured brilliancy of the contests. Tomorrow evening, the management will give a grand ball at the casino, which they intend shall eclipse all previous ones of the season.

The following is the programme and entries up to date: Part I: Running long jump; entries, Woodhouse, Dunbar, Jardine, Barry. Second.—100 yards flat race; entries Woodhouse, Proctor, Warring, Roy Jones, Jardine, R. P. Carter, K. Carter, Barry.

Third.—100 yards three leg race; teams to be drawn on the ground. Fourth.—200 yards hurdle race over eight hurdles; entries, Jardine, Roy Jones, Barry, Woodhouse, Proctor, R. P. Carter, K. Carter.

Fifth.—Tug of war, teams to be drawn on the ground. Part II: Striking the ball, running start; entries, Proctor, Woodhouse, Young, Warring, Haigh, Jardine, Bolton, R. P. Carter.

Second.—In and out race, posts to be twelve feet apart, to be run in heats of two, the length of the polo ground and back; entries, Haigh, Proctor, Woodhouse, Jardine, Warring, Young, Barry, Machell R. P. Carter.

Third.—Stick and ball race to be run in heats of two, starting from goal line, through the opposite goal and back, entries, Young, Warring, Woodhouse, Bolton, Jardine, Proctor, R. P. Carter.

Fourth.—Goal line and back; entries, Proctor, Woodhouse, Haigh, Jardine, R. P. Carter, Warring, Young, Machell, Barry.

Fifth.—Umbrella race, contestants to run fifty yards, to ponies held by boys, carrying saddle, bridle, and umbrella, then to saddle, bridle, light a cigar, open umbrella, mount and then race the length of the ground, first past the post to win, umbrella to be open and cigar alight; entries, Proctor, Woodhouse, Young, Haigh, R. P. Carter, K. Carter, Jardine, Machell, Barry.

Sixth.—Tandem race, ride one pony and drive another twice round the grounds; entries, Proctor, Woodhouse, Jardine, Haigh, Young, Machell, R. P. Carter.

Seventh.—Hurdle race for polo ponies only, twice round the grounds over six hurdles. D. Morriarity and family, who have been here for the past three months, returned home today.

AUGUST EXITS.

People Who Joined the Majority Last Month.

Those who did not die last month may be interested in knowing something about the statistics of those who did. Dr. Granville MacGowan, the city health officer, in his report says there were 73 deaths, which he figures to be an annual rate 10.95 to the 1000 inhabitants. The number attributed to each disease was as follows: Typhoid fever, 1; diphtheria, 2; croup, 1; diarrhoeal disease, under 5 years, 4; diarrhoeal disease, over 5 years, 1; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 19; meningitis, 3; apoplexy, 1; convulsion, 2; diseases of nervous system, 5; diseases of heart, 8; bronchitis, 3; diseases of respiratory system, 1; enteritis, gastritis, peritonitis, 3; inanition and marasmus, 8; suicide, 1; accident and violence, 1.

Of these unfortunates 67 were Caucasian, one African and five were Mongolians. There were 86 births during the month and 7 still births. Of the births 38 were males and 48 females.
