

AT THE CAPITAL.

The Tariff Bill Passes the Senate.

The Vote Was 40 For and 29 Against Its Passage.

A Conference Committee on the Measure Appointed.

The House Unable to Secure a Quorum—Speaker Reed Feasted—The Raun Investigation.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—In the senate today, Morgan offered a resolution which went over till tomorrow, calling on the secretary of the interior for a statement concerning the land claims of the Northern Pacific railroad. Also a resolution embodying instructions to the senate conferees on the land forfeiture bill, in relation to lands of the Northern Pacific and other companies. Laid on the table for future action.

The tariff bill was then taken up, the question being on its passage, six hours being allowed to close the discussion, after which the vote was taken.

Hoar, referring to the reciprocity proposition, said he voted for it yesterday with some hesitation, and should not have done so if he had thought the scheme contained in the amendment was all that was likely to come out of entering on the policy.

Hoar was followed by Hiseock for the Republicans. The Democrats then took a turn, Gibson, Turpie and Vest, speaking in opposition to the bill. Vance and Jones of Nevada also spoke for their respective parties.

The six hours for general debate having expired, the vote was taken and the bill passed—yeas, 40; nays, 29, as follows:

Aldrich moved that the committee insist on its amendments to the house bill, and ask for a conference. The motion was agreed to, and Aldrich, Sherman, Allison, Hiseock, McPherson, Vance and Carlisle were appointed conferees on the part of the senate.

The senate then adjourned.

HOUSE PROCEEDINGS.

No Business Done on Account of the Absence of Mr. O'Ferrall.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—The house was called to order by Speaker pro tem. Burrows. O'Ferrall, of Virginia, raised the point of no quorum present. The speaker being unable to count a quorum the call of the house was ordered. The call resulted: Yeas, 88; nays, 44, but failed to disclose a quorum.

Haugen offered a resolution for the arrest of absentees, pending which O'Ferrall moved adjournment. The motion was lost. A quorum then appearing, after some further discussion the journal was read, but when the previous question was ordered on its approval, the quorum had again disappeared.

Haugen offered a resolution revoking all leaves of absence, except on account of illness.

Flower, New York, raised the point that the resolution was not in order, and the speaker pro tem. over-ruled the point.

O'Ferrall took an appeal. No quorum being in sight, the house, without approving the journal, adjourned.

THE RAUN INQUIRY.

The Tribunal Evidently Biased in the Commissioner's Favor.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—In the Raun investigation today Chairman Morrill proceeded to pass upon the question raised as to the reliance of the testimony offered yesterday by Cooper, relating to the character of the refrigerator company's stock, and ruled it out.

Lewis, the minority member, entered a protest against the narrow limitation, holding that the character of the stock was one of the counter-indictments.

Assistant Chief Bryant, of the pension office, testified that the completed cases order expedited the settlement of some cases and retarded others. More claims had been adjudicated under the order than before it had been made.

To Commissioner Raun witness said that while there had been a larger output of claims under the new order than before, there had been greater haste in the preparation of cases, and much rivalry between clerks. The commissioner wished to know whether witness had tried to put a stop to it. Witness replied that he had no thought of trying to put a stop to it. The 35,000 cases put on completed files by the office had been selected without partiality.

Judge Wilson said it had been stated that Cooper had signed a large number of blank calls upon the pension office for a firm of pension attorneys, and he would like to have Cooper make a statement about it.

Cooper asked the committee to pass upon the resolution referred to it to extend the scope of the investigation. No decision was made and the committee adjourned.

REED'S RETURN.

The Autocrat Feasted by a Clique of His Admirers.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Speaker Reed reached Washington this morning and appeared at the capitol about 11 o'clock. He went at once to his room, where he remained for several hours, seeing no one. It was expected that he would take his seat at the opening of the session of the house, but he did not respond to the summons of the door-keeper, so speaker pro tem Burrows called the house to order.

At 2 o'clock Reed was given lunch by about twenty members of the house, including the chairmen of the various committees, and those who took part in the Maine campaign. He sat at the head of the table and was evidently in the best of humor with himself, and at least as much of mankind as was assembled about him.

NEW APPOINTMENT.

The Proposed Redistricting of the States for Members of Congress.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10.—Dunnell, of Minnesota, chairman of the house committee on the eleventh census, today introduced an apportionment bill on the basis of one representative for each 180,000 of population. This would provide for a total representation of 355.

WORLD'S FAIR MEETING.

Delegates Assembling for the State Convention.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 10.—Delegates to the world's fair state convention, which begins tomorrow, are arriving, and it is estimated that fully 800 delegates from all sections of the state will be present. The convention will be called to order by Mayor Bond at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, in Metropolitan temple. A caucus of delegates from Los Angeles, San Diego, Santa Barbara and other southern counties was held this afternoon, for the purpose of outlining some plan upon which the delegates could be united in the convention.

A Ranch Fire.

MODESTO, Sept. 10.—Fire broke out in a residence on Warner Bros. ranch, twenty miles east of Modesto, yesterday afternoon, and destroyed the house, its contents and one thousand sacks of wheat stored near by. The furniture of William Sheldon stored in the house, was also burned. The cause of the fire is unknown. Warner Bros.' loss is partially covered by insurance. The loss is \$5,000.

HON. J. DE BARTH SHORB.

He Will Not Announce Himself a Congressional Candidate.

Hon. J. De Barth Shorb returned yesterday from San Francisco, where he had been on business connected with the water company in which, with Hon. Herman Silver and Major E. L. Stern, he is interested. Mr. Shorb and his associates have perfected arrangements, so that in a very few months the great system of distribution will be well under way of construction and Los Angeles supplied with absolutely pure mountain water.

Mr. Shorb will attend the Democratic congressional convention at San Diego. There has been considerable talk about his being a candidate for the nomination, but he told a Herald reporter yesterday that he had made no effort to secure it. He had been the recipient of much favorable comment on the matter, but did not intend to announce himself as a candidate. He could only enter the race by entirely giving up the many enterprises in which he was engaged, and consequently less to himself. When asked as to what his choice would be, he said he had not espoused anyone's cause as yet, but considered that Mr. Rose, if he would accept, would be as strong a man as could be put up.

Mr. Shorb said that the enthusiasm throughout those parts of the state he had visited was as high as ever for the Democratic nominees. There could be little doubt as to the result.
