In department two of the superior court yesterday, Judge Clark transacted nothing but probate business, all other cases which had been set for trial yesterday being continued for the session.

The Seventh Ward Democratic club meets tonight at half past seven o'clock, at their hall, on the corner of Rose and Davis streets, to make preparations for the reception of Pond and Del Valle.

Rev. B. F. Coulter has pitched his commodious meeting tent on the corner of Hill and Fifteenth (Laurel) streets, preparatory to commencing, on Sunday evening, a series of preaching services.

The executive committee of the citizens' association to secure a water supply, to be owned by the city, met last evening at Mr. Burdett's office, in the Rogers building, on New High street.

Yesterday morning the last of the new fire alarm boxes, No. 57, was placed in position at the corner of Montreal street and Bellevue avenue, and at ten o'clock the first alarm was rung in from it to test it.

A twelve-year-old urchin named Chas. Jilson was arrested by detectives Aubel and Bowler at 6 o'clock last evening and lodged in the city jail on the charge of burglarizing the News Boys' Home, and stealing \$3 therefrom.

attempt to reach a definite conclusion, it adjourned until today. The matter will in all probability be referred to the council as a committee of the whole, finally.
