

ANOTHER RAILROAD.

SANTA MONICA AND BALLONA TO BE CONNECTED.

An Incorporation Which Forms an Interesting Problem—The Directors Solid Men—News Notes and Gossip.

Another move on the railroad chess-board was made yesterday, which may be indicative of either Southern Pacific or Santa Fe activity.

It is described as a road to be built from Santa Monica to Ballona harbor, a distance of about five miles; it is to be of standard gauge and to do the business of carrying both freight and passengers.

The move constitutes a very interesting problem. It may be a move of the Southern Pacific to go to Ballona from Santa Monica for the purpose of building a wharf and becoming a direct competitor with the Redondo Beach in the fight for ocean freight, or it may be a move of the Santa Fe to carry its Ballona line, which now does little or no business, to Santa Monica, with a view of getting its share of the very profitable passenger business to the favorite seaside resort.

The directors are solid and clever. James Campbell is a deserved reputation of being a remarkably astute, clear-headed railroad expert; the others are men of rare business ability and capitalists.

General Manager K. H. Wade of the Southern California railroad company and family returned yesterday from San Francisco.

A dispatch to the Pullman agent in San Francisco announces that the long-talked-of and much needed dining cars recently ordered by the Southern Pacific company, to be run on the Central Pacific overland which leaves here daily at 8 o'clock in the evening, will not be ready for the service before the middle or last of November.

Mr. Richard Kerrens of the Los Angeles Terminal company is one of the Chicago world's fair vice-presidents; the meeting of the directors and officers in Chicago has forced him to postpone his visit to Los Angeles.

The Southern Pacific and the Union Pacific have entered into an agreement by which the Union Pacific will run special freight trains over the Southern Pacific's line east.




