The German Democrats will hold a meeting tomorrow evening at Turn Verein hall. Addresses will be made by prominent speakers, in both English and German.

Mrs. Alice Emily Stock, wife of Mr. Frederick Stock, manager of the Sespe stone quarries, was buried on Tuesday at Rosedale. She died from the effects of a surgical operation. Mrs. Stock was thirty years of age, a native of Bath, England, and leaves five children. Mr. Stock, who is widely known and highly respected, is prostrated with grief.

The North Pacific industrial exposition has opened at Portland.

The steamer Wieland, from Hamburg, is reported aground on Romer shoal.

The Colorado Democratic state convention nominated Judge Caldwell for governor.

Pittsburg financial circles are uneasy over the rumored embarrassment of the Iron City Bridge works.

Another rain has visited the San Bernardino valley, and cloudy weather interferes with raising drying.

At Montgomery, Ala., all the copies of the various newspapers coming there, which contained lottery advertisements, have been seized by the federal authorities.

Crops in San Benito county, Cal., are larger this year than ever before.

The regular freight trains are totally unable to handle the freight and special freight trains are run.

Edwin M. Heffman, a brick-layer fell over fifty feet from the top of a chimney at Pasadena. He had several bones broken and severe internal injuries which will probably prove fatal.

The will of Dion Bonicaunt bequeathed all his property to his wife, Josephine Louise Thordyke Bonicaunt. It is expected that objections will be filed immediately on behalf of his divorced wife, Agnes Robertson.

The telegraphers and station agents on the Chicago and Eastern Illinois railroad struck Thursday morning, demanding an increase in wages. They returned to work in the afternoon, to await a conference with the officials.

Representatives of the leading boards of trade throughout the country are meeting in Chicago for the purpose of organizing a national transportation organization for the protection of shippers and merchants from unfair dealing or discrimination on the part of railroads.

Arthur J. Stace, professor of civil engineering in Notre Dame, Indiana, university is dead. Prof. Stace was born in Sussex, England, in 1838. He had been connected with the university of Notre Dame since 1860. He achieved distinction as a poet, humorist and mathematician, and was one of the commissioners to the Paris exposition in 1889.

The Chicago Evening Journal asserts that the Santa Fe officials admit that their corporation has purchased the Colorado Midland road and will also have control of the Rio Grande Western.

While negotiations for the purchase of the latter may result in a failure, to secure direct ownership, the Journal asserts there is no doubt the Santa Fe will, in connection with the Midland, operate it under a long time lease.

The twentieth annual convention of the National Prison Congress opened at Cincinnati, Thursday night. The president of the congress, Ex-President Hayes, delivered an address. He argued against the system of making jails and lock-ups academies of crime, by placing young offenders subject to the influence of professional criminals. He spoke strongly in favor of severer treatment for the incurable criminal classes.

There is very little change in the switchmen's strike in the Union Pacific yards at Denver. The company is working thirty-five new men and seven engines and declare they are handling more freight than they did with the old force of 125 men and thirty engines in the same length of time. None of the strikers have signified a desire to return to work, and probably all their places will be filled by new men, and it is likely also the Switchmen's Brotherhood will refuse to take up the fight.
