

FIELDS OF FLAMES.

Destructive Fires in Central California.

Many Acres of Ranch Property Desolated.

Fences, Pasturage, Timber and Buildings Burned.

Heavy Losses Sustained in the Vicinity of Elverana and Sonoma—General News Dispatches.

SONOMA, Oct. 6.—The forest fire is now completely under control, and no further danger is apprehended of its spreading. About fifty citizens of Sonoma responded to the cry for assistance from the ranchers in the path of the fire, and bravely fought the flames all day yesterday and all night. The fire spread over an area of some twelve miles in length and six in breadth. An aged couple living three miles from town, had a narrow escape from being burned to death. They were alone on their ranch Saturday, and completely surrounded by flames. The fire was burning within 100 yards of their house. A deep creek on the north and west of their habitation is all that saved them. Your correspondent rode over the burned district today, and it presents a scene of desolation hard to describe. Fences are burned down, valuable timber destroyed and thousands upon thousands of acres of feed destroyed. The weather today was very warm.

EVERANA, Cal., Oct. 6.—The fire in the mountains has been subdued. The flames are now confined to the cañons. The mountain fires have done a good many dollars worth of damage by loss of pasturage and fences. The fences that enclosed the Mount Pisgah vineyard, owned by Goldstein & Co., of San Francisco, have been completely destroyed, and considerable damage has been done to the vines. Charles Baker's ranch was visited and seventy-five acres of pasturage destroyed. The fences, pasture and timber on the ranches of Mr. Cady and Dr. Wooster, of San Francisco, were destroyed. At one time it was thought the dwelling and outhouses of H. Appleton would go, but a large party of men by hard work managed to extinguish the flames before they reached the buildings.

Yesterday afternoon about 5 o'clock the flames swept toward the Agua Caliente hotel, but they were headed off by counter fires, and a large party of men arrived with axes, shovels and wet sacks. It was feared the flames would cross Hooker's creek and sweep north towards Los Guillicos. It is estimated that 10,000 acres of pasturage, 700 miles of fences, and 200 cords of wood have been destroyed, which will run the damage done by the fire up to \$30,000. The flames originated on the east side of the Napa mountain range on the ranch of John Nordwell, who set fire to a brush heap, and allowed it to get beyond his control.

ALIENATED AFFECTIONS.

Mrs. Richardson Gets a Verdict for \$20,000 Against Her Husband. NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Mrs. Ada Richardson obtained a verdict before the sheriff's jury today for \$20,000 for the alienation of the affections of her husband, David C. Richardson, to whom she was married in 1874. They lived happily until 1881, when he began to neglect her for Mrs. Ella T. Burt, whose husband is George A. Burt. Mr. Richardson and Mrs. Burt both have cattle ranches in Texas, and are supposed to be there at present. Mr. Burt is understood to have business interests in Peru.

KID THE KILLER.

Seven More Deaths Reported at the Young Renegade's Hands. TUCSON, Ariz., Oct. 6.—Information was received this morning that the Kid, in the mountains near Fort Thomas, shot a young White Mountain Apache. He said the whites and Indians had killed all his friends, and that he would kill everybody he met. An unconfirmed telegram from San Carlos states that six scouts have been killed by the Kid.

ROBERT P. HASTINGS DEAD.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—Robert P. Hastings, a well known attorney and ex-school director, died suddenly yesterday at his home in this city. The deceased leaves a widow and two children. He was a son of ex-Judge S. C. Hastings, founder of the Hastings law college, and at the time of his death was one of the directors of the school. He was the Democratic nominee for congress against W. W. Morrow in 1884.

TAX RATES FIXED.

NAPA, Cal., Oct. 6.—The board of supervisors today fixed the tax rate as follows: General county fund, 22 cents; infirmity, 8 1/2 cents; bonds, 12 1/2 cents; school, 16 cents; roads, 33 cents; making the total state and county tax \$1.50.

MERCED, Cal., Oct. 6.—The board of supervisors fixed the levy for county taxes at 92 cents. The state and county tax together will be \$1.50.

AERIAL NAVIGATION.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 6.—Among the articles of incorporation filed with the secretary of state today, were those of the Mount Carmel Aeronautic Navigation company, of Mount Carmel, for the construction and operation of air vessels for the transportation of passengers and freight; capital stock \$20,000,000. The incorporators are Edwin J. Pennington, James A. Pugh, W. C. Dewey and others.

BLOWN TO PIECES.

DOWNIEVILLE, Cal., Oct. 6.—Last Friday while Charles Vaughan was at work in the Bella Union tunnel near the Port mine, picking out the blast that had failed to explode, the powder ignited and he was blown to pieces. T. Clark had his arm and fingers broken, and was otherwise severely injured.

A NEW BONANZA.

KANSAS CITY, Oct. 5.—Reports have been received at Ardmore, Indian Territory, of the finding of an immense vein of gold and silver in the Arbuckle mountains, in the Chickasaw nation, forty-five miles from Ardmore. Large numbers of prospectors are going to the new diggings.

A REVOLUTIONARY VICTORY.

BRENE, Oct. 5.—The revolutionary party in the canton of Ticino has won a victory on the question of revising the constitution, the vote standing 11,928 for, and 11,836 against.

CATHOLICS NOT TO VOTE.

ROME, Oct. 5.—It is understood the Vatican has decided to advise all Catholics to abstain from voting at the coming election in Italy.

CHOLERA IN BARCELONA.

MADRID, Oct. 5.—Cholera is believed to have broken out in Barcelona, where five suspected cases are reported; two fatal.

It is only a question of time when this country, at least California, will produce all the raisins and fruits needed for consumption, and have a surplus to report.

FARCICAL BUT FATAL.

Fighter Larue's Defense for Causing His Opponent's Death. SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—The trial of the prize-fighter, Larue, for killing Harry McBride at the Golden Gate club, was resumed again today before Judge Shafter and a jury. Dr. Estes gave testimony for the prosecution, which then rested the case for the people. Several witnesses were called for the defense, including the defendant. Their testimony was to the effect that the contest between the men was farcical. Larue stated that he and McBride were drinking together and they had a little dispute which they concluded to settle by putting on the gloves to decide which was the best man. The court took a recess.

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STEEP ASSESSMENTS.

Trouble Among Republican Nominees Who Object to Being Cinched.

The Republican candidates for office were sad yesterday. The few who were not sad were mad, because the county central committee had announced the assessments due from the nominees. A HERALD reporter was told that the would-be assessor, Captain F. Edward Gray, was asked for \$1,200. Whether the gallant captain punged up that amount or not for the empty honor of a nomination could not be learned. The other assessments were said to be in the same proportion, however.

Some of the candidates are kicking, and kicking hard, but the committee insist they must pungle up, and in one or two instances there promises to be a deadlock.
