COURT NOTES.

Some Incidents Noted Yesterday in Legal Circles.

There was no session of the United States circuit court yesterday, owing to the death of Associate Justice Miller.

The case of Tuffree vs. Brock is about to close in department four of the superior court. It has been on for a week. About \$500,000 worth of real estate at San Pedro is involved. The cause will be submitted to Judge Van Dyke Thursday for decision.

Justice Lockwood and a jury in his court were overruled by Superior Judge Cheney yesterday. Ah Pan and Ah Sing, convicted of running a lottery game, in the lower court, were granted a new trial, and the decision of the lower court was reversed. This action was taken on the ground that on the plea of the defendants in the lower court that they had once been placed in jeopardy, no verdict was given.
