CONSERVATION IN THE REPUBLICAN BANKS.

As might have been expected, there was a fluttering amongst the Volsees on the publication of Colonel Markham's letter to Hallock approving of the discharge of the Irish miners and the employment of Chinamen in their places.

The damaging facts have been treated differently by different journals. The San Francisco Call, which proves to be in this campaign, as usual, the most unscrupulous of the Republican journals, calls the letter a forgery.

The Chronicle wisely says, in effect, that the letter was written away back in 1881, and that at that time Mr. Markham had the ordinary eastern notions about labor, but that he knows better now.

This is what in law is known as confession and evasion. The journals published in Los Angeles, the Tribune says nothing editorially, but in the first moments of decay, called the letter a forgery.

the Republican candidate has antagonized the Irish-American vote. It indicates so plainly that he who runs may read that he relies simply on an American vote so hidebound in its exclusiveness that he is willing to antagonize the whole foreign-born vote.

Nor is that by any means all the damaging results of this letter. The American born population of the state of California has repeatedly placed itself on record, and by overwhelming votes, as opposed to Mongolian labor.

Not only that, but the grave moral derelictions for which Mr. Markham has been arraigned in the courts of his country remain to be considered, and they form a most grave and compromising feature of his arraignment before the voters of California.

No farmer or mechanic, no tradesman, no business man in any line, and no workingman of any kind or grade, has ever asked for an increase of the tariff whereby anything should be taken from the private pocket to pile up in the public treasury house.

In the face of these facts, that the common people have seen the commerce of the seas gone from under our flag, have seen the farm and village in New England blighted if not wholly deserted under the recent system of tariff taxation, farming industries all over the land depressed and the mine and mill worker everywhere discouraged and demoralized, what influence has been brought to bear on congress to keep up a fight for a larger tariff rate through two presidential elections, to the general disturbance of all regular general business, and to get, at last, new schedules that make every manufacturing monopoly and every trade trust rejoice?

And is it too much to say that this banded influence was never before so powerful and so unscrupulous? At the last moment the high protectionists had it all their own way in the conferences. Steel rails were cut down \$3 in tax by the house, and the country was glad, but when the bill came out of the conference the old rate of \$14.30 was there!

Some of those who asked for more help were ashamed even to argue their claims. For years the tax on a box of common roofing tin has been \$1.08, though not a person was interested in its manufacture in the country. When the bill came out the schedules showed this \$1.08 grown to \$2.43! And yet not a mill even projected at the time to make it, and not a cent's increase in wages if there were. A party of capitalists in Pittsburg and Chicago, it is said, have condescended to agree to put up a mill if they can have the above tax kept on the article five years, and admit it would be a bonus of \$16,000,000 a year, or a grand aggregate of \$80,000,000 subsidy!

Without a doubt there has come a change for the better over this section that will increase and intensify until it reaches the proportions of a flood-tide of real prosperity. At the bottom of this lies the profits our farmers have made during the past summer out of their fruit and other crops. The winter will duplicate this in the walnut, orange and early vegetable crops.

The Times, however, gives the game away in a sentence whose meaning no man of ordinary intelligence can doubt. It says, in the course of a long, labored and disingenuous article: Looking at these charges from the standpoint of practical politics, considering the smallness of the Irish vote in California and the small percentage of that vote which can be expected to support the Republican ticket; also considering the large number of respectable voters, Irishmen as well as others, who believe that workingmen of all nationalities should give value received for their wages, it appears, to the man up a tree, that the authors of this great exposure have fired off something which is likely to prove a boomerang.

The first Raymond excursion left Boston yesterday for Los Angeles. The tide of travel to this coast from the east has set in in good earnest.

The Haytian corvette Jacmel, was run into and sunk by a merchant vessel, near Cape Haitien. During the first two weeks in October, 486 cases of cholera, with 259 deaths, were reported in Spain. The epidemic shows a general decline.

Paris Siecle says the Italian premier recently offered to give France full liberty of action in Tunis if she would abandon her interests in Tripoli. Champeon, the Australian labor leader, has cabled Burns, in London, that money from England will be useless to prevent the failure of the strike.

A fire in the dome of the cathedral at Silna, Italy, was subdued with much difficulty, just before reaching the church proper, which is filled with art treasures. It has been arranged that a general strike of the employees on the tramway lines in Vienna shall take place Sunday.

The Sultan of Zanzibar has surrendered to Germany for 4,000,000 marks his sovereign rights over the portion of the East African coast leased to the German East African company. Prices in the Glasgow iron market collapsed in consequence of a report that the funds of the union to which the striking furnace men belong here have given out, and the men, having no other means of support, would be compelled to return to work.

A papal encyclical to the Italian bishops strongly protests against the government's violating the liberty and rights of the papacy and Catholicism, accuses the Free Masons of reversing modern society, and asks the prayers of the faithful. A Clergyman's Sentence. New York, October 17.—Albert Vedder, formerly a Presbyterian clergyman, was sentenced to five years' imprisonment today, for the abduction of 15-year-old Mary McCann.
