More recently the Castac killing took place, and Mr. Aguirre made a long journey, and acquired much glory—for what? For getting the men? Well, not that time, for he got nothing.

Then there was Morales! How the papers did resound with Martin's bravery in chasing that outlaw. Carleton has just been singing Strauss' opera, "The Brigand." In that opera the captain of the horse marines tells what he will do in the way of cutting up the brig and chief—when he catches him. He never did catch him, and that is the way Aguirre caught Morales.

If Walter S. Moore is to be preferred to John R. Matthews, then, sobriety, decency of life, integrity of character, being a gentleman and all the other higher qualities of manhood go for little among us. Matthews is a man of stainless life and unblemished character, the other is about as far removed toward the opposite as a man can be.

JOHN WOLFSKILL yearly pays into the county treasury many thousands of dollars taxes levied on his property here. Judge Carpenter has not paid one dollar of tax, in all the time he has resided here, excepting perhaps it be a trifle on a little bit of personal property.


