THE COURT INSTRUCTS THE JURY TO ACQUIT HIM, AND THEY ACCORDINGLY SAY THAT HE WAS INNOCENT.

T. J. Cuddy, who formerly held the position of chief of police in this city, was tried yesterday in the United States district court for perjury.

The indictment recites that Mr. Cuddy, after having taken an oath in the district court, falsely stated certain material matter in the following words: "I didn't know that Mr. McGarvin or any other gentleman in particular would be called on the occasion," meaning the trial of the cause of the United States against W. More Young. Another alleged perjury was: "I never dreamed that he was to be a jurymen, and don't now." Several other remarks made by Mr. Cuddy while being examined for contempt of court, which are embodied in the indictment, tend to deny that he knew that Mr. McGarvin was a United States juror. The case was hotly contested by T. B. Brown, Esq., and Judge Carpenter. The latter demanded that the court should dismiss the indictment because there was absolutely no testimony, either direct or circumstantial, to convict the defendant. The court denied this motion, but soon afterwards, while Judge Carpenter was arguing, instructed the jury to bring in a verdict of not guilty, which they did without leaving their seats.
