A SMALL BLAZE.

A Print Shop and Club Rooms Receive a Scorching. At 1:40 o'clock yesterday afternoon a general alarm was rung in from box 36 for a serious blaze in the two-story brick building on Requena street, occupied by George Hazard, the harnessmaker, People & Warden, printers, and the Colored Concord club. Four engines were soon on the ground, but fortunately the fire had not obtained much headway, and was quickly extinguished. The blaze originated in the rooms of the colored club, where several cans of oil, torches and a set of brass musical instruments were stored, and damage was done to the extent of \$500 in these apartments. Hazard sustained some damage by smoke and water, but his loss was fully insured. The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is believed to be the work of an incendiary. Three boys were arrested by Detective Bowler on suspicion of being connected with the matter, but as nothing definite could be charged against them, they were released after a severe lecture. The affair is being thoroughly investigated.
