NEWS NOTES.

Robert Y. McBride was yesterday presented with a twelve-pound boy by his amiable wife.

United States Deputy Marshal Marsh left for the north yesterday to arrest a man who has sold whisky to Indians.

The steamer Eureka from San Francisco arrived at Redondo yesterday morning with 87 tons of merchandise.

The board of supervisors is still canvassing the vote. It is not anticipated that they will conclude the work before Saturday.

A sandstorm which blew in the desert yesterday, overcast the sun during the major part of the day, and gave a gloomy appearance to the city.

The first musicale and literary entertainment of the season, will be given at the Hanna college on Eighth and Hope streets, on Friday evening at 8 o'clock.

The promoters of the Belt Electric Railroad company, it is rumored, are negotiating for the purchase of the franchise of the Second-street cable road, providing the bonus subscribed can be transferred with the right of way.

The Spanish-American Democratic club held a large and enthusiastic meeting last evening, at which a resolution endorsing Frank A. Mauricio, for the office of city auditor, was unanimously passed. Speeches were made by A. Orilla, Don M. Marquez and others.

Isaac D. Ruff, a brakeman in the employ of the Santa Fe company, at the Needles, was fatally injured on Monday night by being crushed while at work. He died on Tuesday morning, and the body was brought to this city last night, and received by Colonel L. R. Dunkelberger, an uncle of the unfortunate.

Shortly after 3 o'clock yesterday morning the inmates of Frank Hicks' residence on the corner of Eleventh and Main streets, were aroused by the cook, who had been awakened by three men attempting to effect an entrance to her room by the window. The police were notified by telephone, and mounted officer Huston was dispatched to the scene, but the intruders had disappeared and no clue as to their identity could be obtained.

Rudolf Wittke, an elderly German, was arrested on the east side last night as insane, and was lodged, after a desperate struggle, in the city jail. He was wandering about the streets of East Los Angeles with a lantern in one hand and a club in the other, and when stopped by Officer Craig, he made so desperate a resistance that it required the combined efforts of Captain McKee and officers Richards and Craig to hold him until the arrival of the patrol wagon.

A number of people are in the habit of fastening their horses and buggies to posts by means of a chain and padlock on the principal thoroughfares. Although this might not cause any trouble in the daytime, it does at night when the street-sweepers are at work. It is impossible for them to clean the streets when they cannot move the vehicles that are in the way. Numerous complaints have lately been made to the chief of police about the matter, and if people persist in locking their horses to posts after this, the padlocks will be broken and the vehicles removed.
