NEWS NOTES.

There is a telegram at the Western Union telegraph office for James Rowan. Santos Castro, an idiotic boy, was ordered committed to the Home of the Feeble Minded yesterday by Judge Clark.

J. H. Simpson, a milk man, living on Pio street just outside of the city's limits, died from hemorrhage of the lungs at noon yesterday. An inquest will be held today on the body.

In department five yesterday, in the foreclosure suit of G. G. Green against E. C. Webster and others of Pasadena, judgment was entered for plaintiff for \$24,000 and \$3000 attorney fees.

Health Officer McGowan and Lieutenant Collins of the United States engineer corps, whose special business is to examine water, will examine the water supplied to the consumers of the several water companies of this city today.

A private recital of the works of Mendelssohn will take place at the residence of I. M. Hellman, Thursday evening, November 21st. Misses Leah and Camilla Hellman, Estelle Meyer, Hortense Levy, Miss H. A. Wagner, Messrs. Ed Viereck, Ed Germain, H. Meyer and F. L. Loeb will interpret the compositions.

Dr. Wong, the Chinese physician, was arrested yesterday on a warrant issued by Justice Austin, charging him with having violated the city ordinance requiring physicians to report all cases of diphtheria to the health officer. Wong was taken before Justice Austin for arraignment and released from custody until Tuesday next, when his case will come to trial.

Luis Garofolo, the proprietor of a saloon in Sonoratown, frequented by Italians, was yesterday fined in the sum of \$25 by Justice Austin for battering a customer named John Capera, on Friday afternoon, during an altercation over a game of cards. Luis Moracco, the bartender at the saloon, was also fined in the sum of \$15 for taking part in the fight; while Capera was compelled to pay a fine of \$15 for taking part in the disturbance.

During the past two weeks the Union-avenue M. E. church, on the corner of Union avenue and Court street, Rev. I. L. Spencer, pastor, has been undergoing repairs and improvements, and will be reopened today. The interior has been hard-finished and painted, and the building is now in good condition for the winter. Rev. W. S. Matthews of the University of Southern California will preach the opening sermon at 10 o'clock this morning.

T. H. Ward, secretary of the board of trade, sent in his resignation to take effect immediately. It was accepted to take effect on the 10th of December, as the board has some business on hand which it will be necessary for Mr. Ward to finish before retiring. A meeting of the directors will be held next Saturday, when applications for the position of secretary will be considered, and Mr. Ward's successor be appointed.

The Grand opera house has been secured and the finest musical talent has been engaged. The programme will include selections from Signorina Luisa Marchetti, Mr. Jos. F.
