The snow which glistened on the top of Old Baldy a few days ago has entirely disappeared. There is talk of building a wagon road to Wilson's peak by way of the Santa Anita cañon.

Council has appointed A. F. Keese and G. H. Snyder special policemen without salary. Peter Stiel has left his camp at Wilson's peak and will remain in town during the winter.

A. B. Manahan, who has been in San Francisco on private business, returned Friday evening. Fourteen candidates were confirmed at All Saints church on Friday night by Bishop Nichols.
