SOME WANT FITZGERALD.

A Republican Predicts Some Opposition to Hazard. "Will Mayor Hazard receive a renomination from the Republicans?" asked a HERALD reporter yesterday of an influential member of that party, a man who is not tied up to any of its cliques.

"He won't, if we can find a good strong man to take the nomination," was the answer. "His action on the Sunday closing ordinance has cost him a good many people's support, and though I believe he has always acted honestly, he has shown poor judgment time and time again. He has vetoed a great many measures, it is true, that were bad, but he has also knocked out good ones."

"A great many of us want W. F. Fitzgerald, but I fear he will not run. The city needs just such a man as Fitzgerald at the head. A man of iron determination, but who is possessed of a level head and good judgment. A man to be

determined does not have to act like a bull in a china shop. Fitzgerald would let nothing swerve him a hair's breadth from the right, and would ride roughshod over all conspiracies and venalities directed against the city's good; but he would always be dignified, just, and an honor to the city."

KILLED HIMSELF.

Milton S. Dimmick Meets With a Fatal Accident. Last night a telephonic message was received at the coroner's office from the University, to the effect that a man had shot himself, but no particulars could be obtained from the person at the other end of the wire.

It was subsequently ascertained, however, by a HERALD reporter, that shortly after 7 o'clock a well known farmer named Milton S. Dimmick, who resides on the Howes tract, in University township, taking a loaded rifle down from a shelf, he seized the barrel of the rifle in his right hand, and attempted to pull it downwards, forgetting that it was suspended from the wall by a nail driven in front of the trigger.

The result was that the trigger caught against the nail and the weapon was discharged, the bullet entering Dimmick's left breast just above the heart. He fell to the ground mortally wounded, and died in less than an hour after the sad occurrence. The deceased was a native of Pennsylvania, 40 years of age, and leaves a wife and family of several children to bemoan their loss. An inquest will be held today.
