BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.

A Lot of Routine Matters Attended to Yesterday.

The clerk of the board was yesterday directed to advertise for bids, to be opened December 10th, for the grading of the county road at Garvanza, from the railroad to the bridge, and for the fill on the east end of the bridge. Bids for county hospital supplies were also ordered advertised, the bids to be opened on the 10th.

The clerk was also instructed to advertise for bids for raising the bridge at Foster's crossing three feet, bids to be opened December 4th.

A notice for bids from electrical engineers and dealers in electrical supplies for the placing of electric wires in the new court house was ordered published. Proposals will be received until December 20th at noon.

On motion of Supervisor Rowan, Supervisor Davis was appointed a committee of one, with power to secure such assistance as he may need, for the framing of a bill to be presented to the legislature for the protection of the county against the overflow of the rivers of this county.

Bids were ordered solicited for the construction of a trestle bridge on the new road across the Laguna ranch.

A rebate of 30 cents per \$100 was ordered in the Santa Monica school district to all the taxpayers, owing to a clerical error which made the value of taxable property in that district read \$168,988, instead of \$1,168,988.

LEGALITIES.

Incidents Which Were Noted in the Courts Yesterday.

In the United States circuit court Judge Ross yesterday made an order that \$75, the money of Frank Bevins, a deceased seaman, be delivered, together with his effects, to E. A. Bevins, his father, who resides in Ohio.

John C. Hickson, a native of Ireland, was naturalized yesterday in department two.

The case of the county against First Cousin L. B. Cohn, who bought Henry Edelman's bogus warrants, was taken up again yesterday by Judge Van Dyke in department four. The defendant declined to offer any testimony. The court ordered that the shorthand reporter write out his notes at the joint expense of the litigants, and the case then went over till December 1st, at 2 p. m.

In department five Mrs. Meffert was granted a divorce by Judge McKinley yesterday, from "Dr." William Meffert, on the grounds of desertion. This Meffert is a notorious person.

In department six yesterday A. J. Vincent, a native of England, was admitted to citizenship.

The information charging Manuel Dominguez with having shot and wounded Antonio Tapia, at Las Virgenes, on the 26th of February, 1889, was yesterday dismissed by Judge Shaw, in department six, the district attorney stating that there was not sufficient evidence to convict the defendant.




