NEWS NOTES.

What is the matter with the young men and women? No marriage licenses were issued yesterday.

The concert which was to have been given by Mrs. T. Masac last evening, at Broadway hall, was postponed till tonight, on account of bad weather.

The Southern California District Medical society convened yesterday in the Bryson-Bonebrake block, room 20. They will hold a session this afternoon.

In consequence of the rain, Miss Grace A. Millmore's concert has been postponed until some future night, due notice of which will be given. Tickets held by purchasers will be good until used.

The four Chinamen arrested on Tuesday afternoon by Detectives Auble and Bowler for playing fan-tan, appeared before Justice Austin yesterday, and upon entering their pleas of guilty to the charge of gambling, were fined in the sum of \$25 each.

Judge Shaw on Tuesday dismissed the case against T. R. Alexander, who was charged with having committed an assault upon Miss Stoermer last August, with intent to commit rape, it appearing from the statement of the district attorney, that the evidence was insufficient to convict.

Ah Kim, the Chinaman arrested on Monday last for stealing a pair of rubber boots from a shoe store on Main street, entered a plea of guilty to the charge of petit larceny yesterday, and was sentenced by Justice Austin to imprisonment in the county jail for the period of six months.

Lester D. Rogers filed his official bond as constable with the county clerk yesterday, with J. M. Clyman and E. F. Teale as sureties. Mr. Rogers will have Los Angeles city township court, and Constable Clements will look after the wants of the two city justice's courts after January 1st.

The board of supervisors met yesterday. The various court officials and clerks were requested to send in to the board a list of the furniture in the court rooms. On motion of Supervisor Hubbard, it was resolved that the county furnish the Los Angeles delegates at Sacramento with precinct maps of the city and county, with the vote recorded thereon, for use in redistricting the county.

Coroner Weldon was summoned to Pasadena yesterday to hold an inquest upon the body of Thomas B. Conden, a native of Wisconsin, 22 years of age, who died of consumption at the police station at that place. Conden was found at 11 o'clock a. m. yesterday on the porch of a residence on Myrtle street, by a mechanic named Fred Swift, who believed the unfortunate youth to be intoxicated, took him to the station, where he died about half an hour after his arrival. The jury returned a verdict of death from natural causes.

A colored man, who introduced himself as George H. Baxter, appeared at the police station last night, and reported that at 7:30 o'clock he was knocked down and robbed by three men, while on his way home, in the rear of Lankershim's bank on Winston street. The highwaymen only succeeded in obtaining \$115 for their pains, as that was all the money Baxter had at the time. The police had not succeeded in capturing the perpetrators of this outrage at a late hour last night.
