Each Blames the Other With Having Planned the Crime—Gouffe Was Fondling Gabrielle on His Knee When the Fatal Noose Entwined Him.

PARIS, Dec. 16.—The trial of Michael Eyraud and Gabrielle Bompard, for the murder of Gouffe, began today.

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CONDENSED TELEGRAMS.

The man arrested at Cayuga, Ont., who was supposed to be Pope, the Louisville, Ky., bank defaulter, turned out to be another man.

P. A. Emanuel, a South Carolina lawyer, has discovered a process by which aluminum can be made from kaolin, at a cost of \$250 per ton.

In Philadelphia Mrs. Senca Bell and her grandchild Olive Torrance, were found dead in bed. It is supposed they were suffocated by coal gas.

Brevet Major-General Alfred H. Terry, on the retired list of the United States army, died at New Haven, Conn., Tuesday morning, of Bright's disease.

At Miller, Ind., William Clark, an employee of the Elma powder company, was killed and several others probably fatally injured, by an explosion.

Jay Gould expressed himself very well satisfied with what was accomplished at the meeting of railroad presidents Monday. He is confident the result will be a great advantage to the railways and the public.

The officers of the company deny the reported failure of the Iowa, Minnesota and Dakota Elevator company, at Luverne, Minn., saying the report was started by local creditors, who wanted to embarrass the company.

An explosion occurred at the works of the Ohio Powder company, five miles north of Youngstown, O. The mill was blown up, killing two employees—James Kerr and William Lewis. Several others were injured, but not seriously. The building was completely wrecked.

The New York board of general appraisers, in a case brought before it by Marshall, Field & Co., Chicago, has decided that the omission of section 30 does not invalidate the McKinley tariff bill, but affects only the omitted section. They also decided that the bill confers on the president no legislative power. The case will be appealed.
