DOWLEN'S REPORT. He Finds Encouraging Prospects in Los Angeles District. In Expert Dowlen's report for November, he reviews the condition of the vines in all the counties of the Los Angeles district, and finds "the outlook quite encouraging."

Since the last report a number of journeys have been made to the vineyards in the neighboring counties of San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Ventura and Orange, all of which are included in the Los Angeles district.

In Santa Barbara county, a comparatively small amount of attention appears to be given to viticulture. Here also, low prices and limited means of transport have operated to check the industry; moreover, where the vineyards are open to the sea air, and in the case with many of the older vineyards, the fruit produced cannot compete in quality with that raised in more inland districts.

In each of the above three counties the intention was generally expressed of making considerable plantings of vines during the coming year, raisin grapes receiving more attention than wine grapes.

these new vines are three years of age; the youngest were set out this year. Nearly all of these new vines are Muscat. Besides these, a few Mission vines have been planted. The older vines show, in places, a little disease, but by far the greater proportion of those set out this year show no disease.


From the above statements it will be seen that in Orange county the Anaheim disease is evidently not so virulent as in past years, and that, though the trouble has by no means passed away, the outlook for viticulture is much more hopeful than it was twelve months ago.
