AT WESTLAKE PARK.

FIFTEEN THOUSAND PEOPLE SEE THE FIREWORKS.

A Good-Natured Crowd and a Poor Exhibition—The Car Service Inadequate. Many People Walk Home.

'Look out for the stick!' There were 15,000 people at Westlake park last night, yelling themselves hoarse at the display of pyrotechnics, dodging sky-rockets and otherwise acting as a great big good-natured Los Angeles crowd always will.

For the crowd was good-natured, though if they had stopped to consider, there was sufficient reason for them to be very much otherwise. The whole affair was a great fizzle. The fireworks were disappointing; ropes kept almost all those for whom the show was intended from getting a good view of it, and the points of vantage were all "reserved"—a queer word to use in connection with a public park—for those who stood in.

The display was made to represent a battle between a shore battery and a man of war. Brisk firing with roman candles was kept up for half an hour between the fort, which was built at the northwest corner of the park, and one of the ships, which was anchored below. Then the other warship left its station at the southern extremity of the pond and aided the fort to vanquish the foe.

Among the pyrotechnic designs were an immense fish, or whale, which was put on floats and moved gracefully over the water, several combination pieces, and the word "adieu" in immense letters of red and yellow, which signified that the display was over.

All along the banks of the lake, almost encircling it, were stretched at brief intervals gayly-colored Chinese lanterns which added much to the beauty of the scene.

The cable company could not begin to handle the crowd which visited the park and about half of those who went out had to walk. Every train was composed of three cars, and even the roofs of these were crowded with passengers.

The new electric line carried out a few people, but they were not in a condition to accommodate many.

What the Weather Bureau Says of Them. The weather bureau furnishes the following crop report:

Hueneme, S. L. Mack—Fogs prevailed during the week, which were beneficial to bean and corn crops.

Anaheim, M. Nebelung—The early part of the week was very warm, the

temperature approaching 100 degrees in the shade. No damage reported from the excessive heat.

Tustin, E. D. Buss—Active work on apricots will begin within a few days. Half a crop will be gathered, but the fruit is of finer quality than last year. Highest temperature, 80 degrees.

National city, Arthur H. Wood—Quality of fruit finer than ever, and commanding good prices on account of small crop. Apricots, blackberries and raspberries in height of season. Highest temperature, 76 degrees; lowest, 56 degrees.


