A preliminary survey was already made by the United States coast survey, but hitherto no joint action has been had.

An international commission will be appointed to consider and report regulations which may be adopted by the United States and Canada, for the prevention of destructive methods of fishing, and the uniform close seasons and other means for the preservation and increase of fish.
